The appropriation of the National house of representatives to give twenty million dollars for the starving Russians will not meet with approval in the South. We are glad to note that the congressmen from South Carolina did not support the measure. Appropriations for help of the needy in our own country would be more in order.

Brace up. A hard luck story will never get you anything—not even sympathy.

Albertus Voght, discoverer of phosphate in Florida, and prominent in the building of railroads in Mexico and the Southwest, died at his home in Jacksonville, Fla., Tuesday, after a long illness. Mr. Voght, who was 71 years old, and a native of Eutawville, S. C., discovered the phosphate deposit at Dunellon, in May, 1889, while sinking a well, and later sold his small piece of property for \$200,000. After completing his education at Furman University, Greenville, S. C., and the Kentucky Military Institute, which had been interrupted by the war between the states, during which he served in the Confederate army. Mr. Voght went to Mexico, where he became engaged in surveying railroad routes. On his return to this country he became chief of the engineers corps of the Southern Pacific Railway and was in charge of that department when the route to Los Angeles from the east was selected.

Wolfe Lindenfield, alias William Linde, has been arrested by the police at Warsaw, as a suspect in connection with the Wall Street explosion in New York Sept. 16, 1920. The Warsaw police said they made the arrest at the request of the American Department of Justice. They claimed to have in their possession the man's full confession that he was connected with the disaster. Lindenfield is described as a cousin of Rosa Luxemburg the German Radical Socialist leader, who was shot to death in Berlin early in 1919, after having been beaten by a mob. His confession, the police say, gives the names of the ring leaders and the New York city address where the bomb was manufactured. It was intended for J. P. Morgan, but exploded prematurely. Sylvester Cosgrove, an American Department of Justice agent, at whose request, in behalf of the department, the

arrest of the suspect was brought about, declared that Lindenfield has agreed to turn state's evidence and is willing to return to America, where he has a wife and two children. The suspect's written confession according to the agent, says that \$30,000 was promised for the job, to be divided among four or five persons, and that the money was received by the New York Communists from the Moscow Third Internationale.

In an editorial last week the Darlington News and Press calls attention to the damage that has been done and is being done by the heavy traffic of the army trucks passing from Camp Jackson to Camp Brass. This editorial says in part "the road from Society Hill to Cheraw has been practically ruined. This is a long stretch of sandy roadway, and it was in the best of condition." The editor of the Leader and Vindicator can vouch for this statement from first hand knowledge. Before the moving of Camp Jackson started it was a pleasure to travel over this piece of roadway, and now it is probably one of the worst pieces of roadway in Darlington county. All roads traversed by these heavy trucks are in terrible shape, and we join with our esteemed contemporary in expressing the opinion that the government should make some provision for putting these roads in good condition. 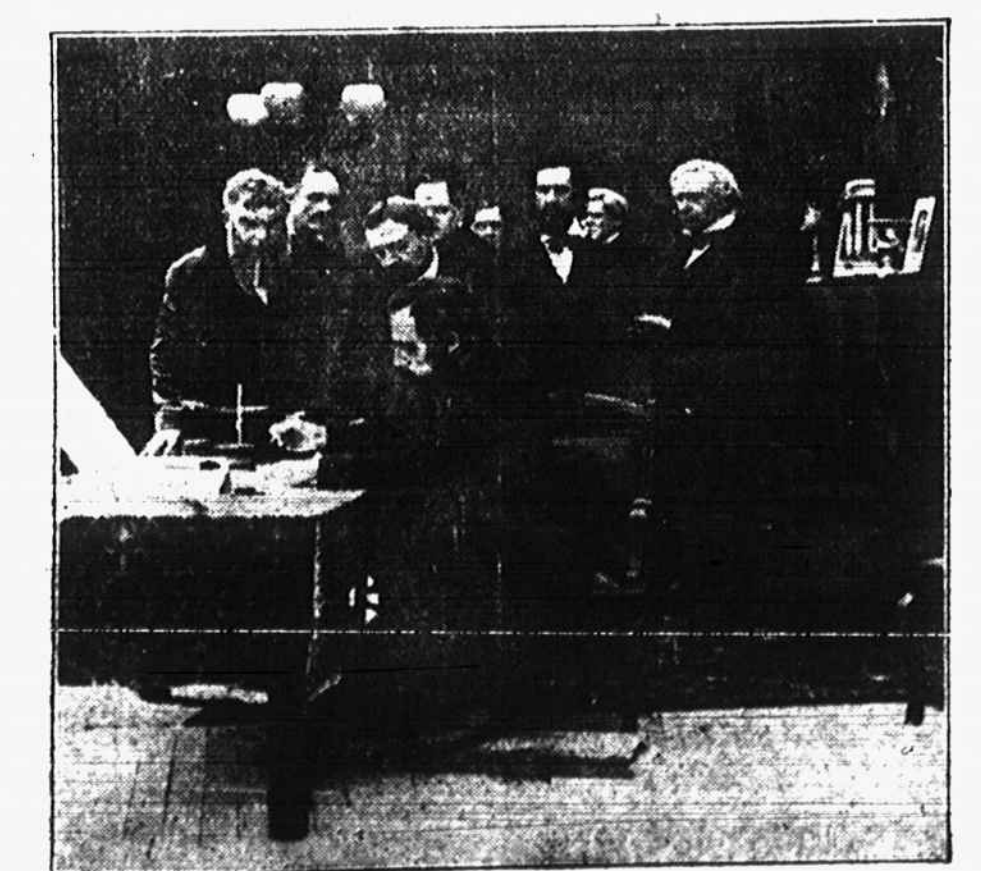
