In order that we may systematize our buying for the various departments and fix responsibility for purchases and with no reflection intended against anyone, the following rules will be strictly adhered to:

- Purchases for Police Department to be made by Chief of Police A. G. Whitaker and Chairman of Police Committee, W. L. Jackson, and so approved.
- Purchases for the Street Department to be made by Street Commissioner W. D. Whitaker, and Chairman of Street Commission, E. C. Zemp, and so approved.
- Purchases for Fire Department to be made by Chief W. F. Nettles, Foreman James B. Zemp, and Chairman of Fire Department Committee, W. R. Hough, and so approved.
- Purchases for the Health Department to be made by Health Officer J. W. Wilson, and Chairman of the Health Board, C. W. Billings, and so approved.
- Purchases for the Water and Light Department to be made by Superintendent W. B. Alred, and Chairman of the Water and Light Committee, J. H. Osborne, and so approved.

All bills and accounts subject to final action by Mayor and City Council in regular session. These rules are effective at once and purchases not made in the above described manner will not be considered as indebtedness of the city.
