Items of Interest from Various Sections of South Carolina.

Darlington, May 23.—While out shooting clay pigeons a few miles from town one day last week, M. E. Cogges shall suffered a very painful injury when the barrel of his gun bursted and inflicted severe injuries on his left hand. He was carried to the Florence Infirmary where the wound was dressed and at this time it is healing nicely.

Chester, May 23.—Jordan Brakefield, young planter of the Lowryville section of Chester county, who sustained a broken collar bone and other painful bruises in an automobile accident near R. C. Guy's home Sunday and was taken to the Chester sanatorium, has been taken home, and should no unforeseen difficulties arise, he should soon be all right.

Anderson, May 28.—A building contract closed recently is one awarded the W. L. Brissey Lumber Co. for the erection of four houses at Gluck Mills, the aggregate cost being approximately \$25,000. With the building of these four new houses, which are to be occupied by certain of the officials of the mill, something of the new development is being started there. The four houses will be in a section of the community only a short distance from the paved extension of South Main street.

Newberry, May 23.—Another pretty piece of work has been done by the Newberry police in running down a theft. During the Chautauqua, Harold Lewis, pianist, had two fraternity pins, a fountain pen and several other articles stolen from his coat, out of the dressing room. The case was reported to the police and they began to work on it, with the result that they have already secured one of the fraternity pins and have two negroes lodged in jail as suspects one of the two having a bad past record for such work.

Columbia, May 23.—Because of its excellent record and its value to the state, Governor Harvey this afternoon wrote a letter to the board of pardons, recently resigned, asking the members if they would receive reappointment at his hands. It is customary for the board to resign on the retirement of the appointing governor. The board consists of W. P. Conyers, of Greenville, chairman; B. F. Pegues, Cheraw, and Joseph Nettles, Columbia, secretary.

Anderson, May 23.—The first bill of indictment handed the grand jury today when the federal court of the Western district convened was one in which the government charges Campbell Courtenay, St. John Courtenay, Ashmead Courtenay, Edwin P. Frost, Henry Rutledge Buist and Francis J. Pelzer which conspiracy to defraud the government. A separate bill charges Campbell Courtenay with perjury, and

two additional bills charge St. John Courtenay and Campbell Courtenay with violation of the income tax law. Judge, H. H. Watkins explained the first bill to the grand jury by saying that when two or more persons agree or conspire to commit any offense against the United States, and that one of the party does any act to effect the object of such agreement or conspiracy, then all were guilty of conspiracy. The indictment, he said in part, charges these men, as officers and directors of the Courtenay Manufacturing company of making a fraudulent income tax return. In the case against Campbell Courtenay, charged with violation of the income tax law, it was alleged that he omitted from his return any profit from the sale of his stocks, while evidence of the government showed profit from the sale of shares of Victor Monaghan mill stock, said Judge Watkins, and the same charge is made against St. John Courtenay as against Campbell Courtenay. The offense of conspiracy is punishable by a fine of not more than \$10,000 or imprisonment of not more than two years, or both, and the penalty for perjury is a fine of not more than \$2,000 or not more than five years imprisonment. Judge Watkins told the jury.

AN ORDINANCE.
State of South Carolina,

City Council of Camden

An Ordinance ordering an election submitting to the qualified electors of the city of Camden the question of the issuing of Two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) municipal bonds, for the purpose of paving streets of the city of Camden, South Carolina.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Camden, South Carolina, in due session assembled, this 17th day of May, 1922:

1. That in response to a Petition of the majority (as appears upon the tax books of the said city) of the freeholders of the city of Camden, South Carolina, requesting the ordering of an election for the purpose of the issuance of Two hundred thousand (\$200,000) dollars municipal bonds of the city of Camden, South Carolina, proceeds of same to be used for the purpose of paving the streets of city of Camden, South Carolina, that an election be, and is hereby ordered to be held in the city of Camden, South Carolina, on Tuesday, the 13th day of June, 1922, on the question of issuing Two hundred thousand (\$200,000) dollars coupon bonds of the city of Camden, for the purpose of paving streets of the city of Camden, South Carolina.

2. That said bonds be issued of the denomination of One thousand (\$1,000) dollars each, and to bear interest at the rate of not more than 5 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually from date of bonds and to mature forty (40) years from the date of the issue, with the privilege of redemption by the city of Camden, South Carolina, after twenty (20) years from the date of said issue. That said Two hundred thousand (\$200,000) Dollars of Bonds to be issued either all at one time, or in blocks, at such times and in such blocks as may be hereafter determined by the City Council.
