Women Make Appeal.
Editor of The Camden Chronicle:
For years, perhaps centuries, women as individuals in their homes have been making a fight against alcohol. The right to vote gives them an opportunity to combine—not against the men—but with the best men, and fight as an organized army with the combined strength of all for the common good.
When the welfare of the community is at stake, the right to vote becomes a duty—a new responsibility that many women would have been glad to escape.
It is easy to see why women long for actual enforcement of prohibition. It involves no personal sacrifice to them as a class. They are the chief sufferers from man's dissipation. Many a man admits that real prohibition would be a good thing for the country, but not convenient for himself—“Aye, there's the rub.”
Is it possible to so frame our laws and choose our executives that alcoholic drinks will be really inaccessible to those too weak to resist their power or too selfish and unpatriotic to permit the good of the country and the safety of our laws ahead of personal indulgence? This is the end we must fight with patience and faith. Of still greater importance is the education of our young people as to the real nature and physical effects of alcohol.
We appeal to the many brave men who were willing to die for their country and to endure untold horrors in the trenches, to make much smaller sacrifices for a much greater victory, the victory of civilization over the progress of alcohol, in which it is fitting that America should lead the world.

In a recent canvass of our town over 200 names were signed to the following paper showing that the women of Camden are practically unanimous in their stand. There were perhaps a half dozen who, for one reason or another did not sign their names. However this does not mean that they are in sympathy with bootleggers. There were also a few that the committee failed to see.
The following is the paper that was signed:
We the undersigned women of Camden, being fully convinced that the prohibition laws are very flagrantly violated in and around our city, and believing that it is the wish of the council to enforce these laws, do hereby request them of our hearty cooperation and urge them, both as individual citizens and as a body, to redouble their efforts to make our city safer for the young men now growing up by using every means in their power to enforce both the spirit and the letter of the law.
