

FOUR NEW PUBLICATIONS:

Feeding Dairy Animals and Crop Rotations Given Attention.

Clemson College, Sept. 20.—Four little publications of timely interest just issued by the Extension Service of Clemson College, two on feeding dairy animals and two on crop rotations, are ready for distribution to those who desire them. These are Information Card 23, "Feeding Dairy Cattle"; Information Card 24, "Feeding Dairy Calves"; Extension Circular 39, "Crop Rotations for Piedmont Counties"; and Extension Circular 40, "Crop Rotations for Eastern and Southern Counties."

The Information Cards are intended as practical feeding guides and contain each sixteen general suggestions, besides recommended rations for calves and cows. They should be of special benefit to farmers who are now in the dairy industry, which is making such rapid gains in this state.

The rotation circulars are published in the interest of the present cover crop and soil building campaign being conducted by the Extension Service. Circular 39 contains crop rotations for the upper Piedmont counties, including Oconee, Pickens, Greenville, Spartanburg, Cherokee, and York; and for the lower Piedmont counties, including Anderson, Abbeville, McCormick, Greenwood, Laurens, Newberry, Fairfield, Chester, Union, northern Lancaster, upper Lexington, Saluda, and Edgefield. Circular 40 contains rotations suggested for the Pee Dee counties, including Sumter, Lee, Darlington, Marlboro, Dillon, Florence, Clarendon, Williamsburg, Marion, Horry, and Georgetown, for the Sand Hill counties including Kershaw, Chesterfield, lower Lancaster, Richland, Lexington, and Aiken, and for the South ern counties, including Calhoun, Orangeburg, Barnwell, Allendale, Hamberg, Dorchester, Colleton, Hampton, Jasper, Beaufort, Charleston, and Berkeley.

AN ORDINANCE.

To Raise Supplies for the City of Camden, S. C. for the Year 1922

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Camden, S. C., and by authority of the same, that the following taxes be, and the same are hereby levied for the current year from the 1st day of January, 1922, to the 31st day of December, 1922.

Section 1. A tax of 20 mills on each dollar assessed value of real and personal property within the corporate limits of the City of Camden, S. C., from the first day of January, 1922.

Section 2. That an additional tax be levied on each dollar assessed value of real and personal property within the corporate limits of the City of Camden, S. C., of an amount from said tax under the laws of the State, to be used for the purpose of erecting a new bridge over the creek which crosses the space of line, not exceeding six (6) days in one year; providing that at the time of receiving such notice any person may pay to the person giving such notice Three (3) Dollars Com- mutation, which shall be received in lieu of the work and that person refusing to work on said street or to

pay said commutation shall be fined not less than Ten (10) Dollars nor more than Fifty (50) Dollars, or be imprisoned not less than ten days nor more than 20 days, in the discretion of the City Recorder.

Section 3. The tax books for the collection of city taxes will be open in Council Chamber, Camden, S. C., on the 2nd day of October, 1922, and remain open each day, except Sunday, from 9 a. m. to 1 p. m., and from 3 p. m. to 4:30 p. m. until the 1st day of November, 1922, inclusive.

Section 4. That when the taxes and assessments or any portion thereof charged against any property or party on the duplicate for the current fiscal year shall not be paid on or before the 1st day of November, the City Clerk and Treasurer shall proceed to add a penalty of one centum on said duplicate and the said Clerk and Treasurer shall collect same and if the said taxes and assessments and penalties are not paid on or before the 1st day of December thereafter an additional penalty of one per centum shall be added by the City Clerk and Treasurer on the said duplicate and collected by the City Clerk and Treasurer; That if said taxes, penalties and assessments are not paid on or before the 15th day of December, next thereafter, an additional penalty of five per centum thereon shall be added by the City Clerk and Treasurer on said duplicate and collected by the City Clerk and Treasurer. And if said taxes, penalties and assessments are not paid on or before the 31st of December, next thereafter the City Clerk and Treasurer shall issue his tax executions for all taxes, assessments and penalties against the property of the defaulting taxpayer according to law.

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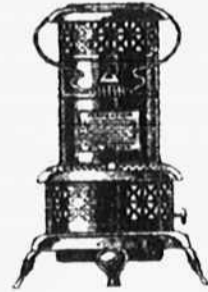
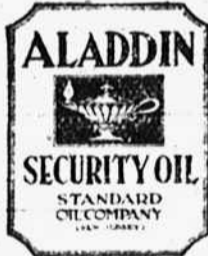
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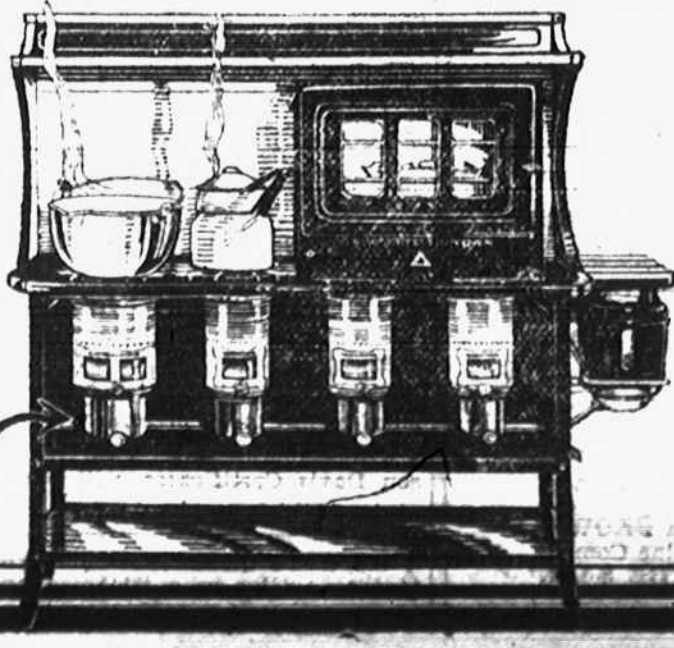
