

JEFFORDS RESENTENCED.

To Be Electrocuted at State Penitentiary December 22.

Columbia, Nov. 22.—F. M. Jeffords, convicted of the murder last spring of J. C. Arnett, his partner in a gristmill killing station, today was sentenced in Criminal Court here to be electrocuted at the State penitentiary on December 22. A motion by counsel for Jeffords whose clemency recently was affirmed by the Supreme Court for a further stay of execution, was denied a few minutes before sentence was passed.

Ira Harrison, also under death sentence for the murder of Arnett, was not brought into court today, his attorneys having secured a stay of execution from the Supreme Court pending further appeal. Following affirming of the sentence, Glenn Trexler, the third of the alleged slayers of Arnett, is serving a life sentence in the penitentiary.

Link of Chain in His Head.

Aiken, Nov. 22.—W. H. and of a half-inch link of a steel chain embedded two inches in the depths of his head. P. J. Moore, a young overseer at a saw mill near Logfield, was carried to the Aiken Hospital late Friday night for an operation in the belief hope of saving his life. Dr. A. H. The accident occurred in the Meeting Street section Friday afternoon, when the chain of a sawdust conveyor escaped under pressure and struck Moore behind the right ear, a link sinking deep through the skull. The man never lost consciousness and spoke to the physicians in a quiet house physician at the hospital, who An operation was performed at the original and the chain link lifted from his head Friday night by the way relative to the fearful accident. Saturday held out hopes of the patient's recovery despite the wound.
