The motherless child as a class, from an infant to the grown up, is the greatest sufferer on the earth. The biggest death rate, by more than double, is found with the motherless babies. The biggest per cent of disgraces to individuals, families, and communities, found in any one class, is among the motherless children. The biggest leaks in our Sunday Schools and Churches is with the motherless child.

Home of J. A. McCaskill Burned.

On last Sunday morning at about 11:30 o'clock, while the family of J A. McCaskill were in attendance upon the services at the Presbyterian church, their home on south Cleveland street caught fire on the kitchen roof and being fanned by a fierce wind which was blowing at the time, the flames spread rapidly and soon enveloped the entire building. When first discovered by a member of the immediately back of the McCaskill home, the blaze was just starting, but it was some time before water was gotten on the buildings and the pressure was not sufficient at the start to subdue the flames. 
