**Marriage in Colored Society.**

Invitations have been issued to the marriage of C. C. Brevard, the colored dentist of Camden, to Gertrude H. Sawyer, of Bennettsville, S. C. The wedding to take place at 118 Robeson street, Bennettsville, S. C. on Thursday, June 14th. The bride-to-be is a daughter of the president of the negro business league of South Carolina, who is also an attorney and founder of the Workers Enterprise Bank and ready dealer of Bennettsville. Dr. Brevard is a member of an old time family of that name and is a worthy colored citizen.

**Direct Cable Money Transfer Service.**

Manager Dickson of the Western Union Telegraph Company announces an arrangement effective as of June 1, whereby cabled money transfers to France will be paid in American funds at the option of the sender. In other words, if, say, \$100 is cabled via Western Union to Paris, the amount will be paid at destination either in U. S. currency or in francs, according to the choice of the remitter.

The particular value of this arrangement is that it eliminates questions of exchange and places the payee in a position to take full advantage of the premium on American currency. It also involves refund of the full amount deposited in the case of non-payment, which is another great advantage in the case of a declining foreign currency.

The Western Union Company believes that the establishment of a direct money transfer service to France on the dollar basis will be a considerable convenience to people desiring to send money cheaply, quickly, safely and directly to their friends or relatives in that country.

South Carolina's commercial crop of early Irish potatoes, which lasts year ran 4,500 carloads, averaging 200 barrels the car, has not yet attained the peak of movement, the season being late by perhaps a week. The crop will bring more than \$4,000,000. The graduating class of 1923 at Wofford College numbers 63 members.

**Mill Dam Broke.**

Owing to the excessive rains of Tuesday night the dam at Adam's Mill, the property of Mr. G. T. Little, broke in one small place and turned loose quite a bit of water into the Hermitage Mill pond some miles further down. We learn, however, that the Hermitage Mill dam is still quite safe, although a large lot of water came into it. The break at the Adam's pond is not a serious one and it did not drain the pond.

Quite a lot of crops on farms in the vicinity of Adam's pond were badly damaged from the heavy rains, and in some places the crops were completely destroyed.

Rev. D. W. Thomasson, age 82, a Baptist minister of many years service, died at his home in Rock Hill, Sunday morning, Miss Lena Thomasson, a daughter, is a missionary in China.

Rev. S. Hewitt Fulton, of Darlington, who graduated from the Presbyterian Theological Seminary in Columbia this year has received and accepted a call to the pastorate of the Honea Path Presbyterian church.

**Associated Tours Guide For Motorists**  
Motorists who are planning vacation tours during the summer months will be pleased to know that the 1923 Associated Tours Guide, the official road book compiled and published by The Automobile Club of America, is now ready for distribution.

By following the carefully selected road maps with which the Guide's 104 pages are filled summer vacationists are enabled to tour by motor through the most charming sections of the United States and Canada to seaside, mountain and country resorts. All tours in the Guide are compiled with a view to scenic charm; the roads mapped are the best stretches of hard highway that the country affords.

For those visiting the New England country there is a map of the recently adopted road marking system. A large folding road map of the entire country east of Chicago accompanies the Guide.

A feature of the Associated Tours Guide that motorists particularly appreciate is that the itineraries are arranged to allow for logical stopping places at the end of each day's run at towns where accommodations may be readily secured. Synopses of State Motor laws, ferry schedules, and lists of good hotels and garages also go to increase the Guide's usefulness to the automobilist.

**Diamonds From Arkansas.**

Nearly 6,000 diamonds have been found in diamond mines in Arkansas, and some stones have been picked up in other states. The diamond fields of Arkansas are in Scott county, where a valuable diamond was first found in 1906 by John Huddleston, a farmer. The mule he was riding happened to kick up a stone of unusual brilliance, which caught his eye. He dismounted, picked up the stone and put it in his pocket and a few days later the performance was repeated. The stones were sent to Tiffany of New York, whose expert said "diamonds," and soon afterward Mr. Huddleston is said to have sold his 40-acre farm for \$36,000. Though the diamond field of Arkansas has never achieved greatness, it has yielded a considerable number of fine stones, the largest weighing 21 1/4 carats. Another stone weighed 17.86 carats. Many of the Arkansas stones are as fine as any found elsewhere and, according to George F. Kunz, of Tiffany's, they include a large proportion of white stones, most of them of a high grade in color and brilliancy and freedom from flaws. Doctor Kunz further states in describing several of the yellow, brown and white stones from Arkansas, that "these are absolutely perfect and are equal to the finest stones found at the Jagersfontein mine or that were ever found in India."

A few of the Arkansas diamonds, it is said, have sold for as high as \$600 a carat. Most of them, however, are uncut and have been placed in private and museum collection. Diamonds do not occur in clusters, nor are they gathered together in the volcanic "pipes" or mother lodes in which they are found.
