**Gipsy Car Wrecked.**  
Five automobiles loaded with Gypsies bearing New York state license tags, passed through Lancaster Thursday on their way south for the winter. The others were only slightly injured. It was stated that the wrecked automobile, a Cadillac, was traded in to E. C. Bridges at Heath Springs, for a new Buick, after which the party proceeded on their way south.—Lancaster News.

**Duck Carries Band.**  
Walterboro, Dec. 1.—November 15, Harold Fripp shot and killed a duck on Ashepoor river which was banded, carrying band No. 297,656. He notified the bureau of biological survey and has received a card from it stating that this duck was a black banded at Lake Simcoe, Ontario, October 11, by H. S. Osler, of Toronto, Canada. This is interesting as it shows the great distance traveled by these birds and the speed with which they go long distances. This study aids in an investigation being conducted to determine the life history of our native birds.

**DOG TAX.**  
I wish to call special attention to the dog license tax, which can be paid from October 15th, 1923, to February 1st, 1924. (February 1st, 1924, is the last day for the payment of this tax.) The license tax on each dog is \$1.25, and I now have the license tags to supply owners of dogs when paying their license tax. A dog is liable to this tax if six months old or older on January 1st. (A dog born June 30th, 1923, is liable to the tax January 1st, 1924.)  
This is in lieu of all other taxes or licenses on dogs, either county, municipal or otherwise.  
Dog license tag issued by the Treasurer should bear the inscription "Dog License 1924," also show the serial number and county. This is not charged on the Auditor's Duplicate, nor carried on the ordinary tax receipt. Separate receipt necessary.

**NINETY YEARS OF COTTON.**

Prices Have Fluctuated Over Very Wide Range.

A spread of 11,800 points, or \$590 a bale, took place between the high and low on the New York cotton exchange during the year 1884 according to a table recently made public by B. Harris, state commissioner of agriculture, in the Weekly Market Bulletin issued by the state department of agriculture, commerce and industries.

In making this notation, Mr. Harris called attention to the fact that it was the greatest difference in price for any one year from 1829 up to the present time.

"I am doing this for the education of the farmers," said Mr. Harris in explaining his reasons for publishing the full table. "I know they will be interested in reading it and you will observe that it has always advanced in price after it got out of the farmers' hands. And common sense will tell you if it sold for a higher price after it got out of the farmer's hands it was worth it while he owned it. The same thing has happened this year.

Mr. Harris appended the following figures as high and low prices of middling cotton in New York from the year 1829 up to the present:

**Golden Eagle Captured.**  
A splendid specimen of the golden eagle, taken alive near Monck's Corner, in Berkeley county, will be placed on exhibition in the Charleston Museum today. The great bird will be given a cage in the room where the live reptiles are kept, just south of the main entrance of the Museum, and no doubt it will attract many visitors.  
The golden eagle is not only one of the largest and finest looking of all the birds of prey, but it is also a very rare bird in this part of the world and the capture of this specimen is on that account of considerable interest. Whether the eagle wandered here accidentally from the Western regions, where the species is still fairly abundant, or whether it was reared and had its home somewhere in the mountains of North or South Carolina, where a few golden eagles probably still survive, is a question.
