Around sixty thousand dollars outside capital has been invested in Camden realty within the past week. New homes are being built in every section of the city, and we hear of two new streets to be opened up in the near future which will provide excellent building lots for those desiring to own their homes. There are no houses to rent and real estate dealers have calls daily for rental homes.

We regret that we were out of town and could not be present at the open session of the council when Mr. Kendall appeared in the interest of the Waterlee Mills. We had a representative there however, and a report is carried in our news columns. We understand that since Mr. Kendall's explanation of his plan there are many who favor his proposition who were very pronounced against it at first. The matter will very likely be presented to the voters at an early date and we believe that he will be granted the concessions asked for when the matter is put before the people in a clear light. As for our part we would readily take over our share of the extra taxation in order to procure this immense additional enterprise for our city.

Flying Cadet Robert H. McCully, 25, son of Col. and Mrs. E. K. McCully of Greenville, was killed Thursday night when the airplane in which he was flying over Kelly Field, near San Antonio, Texas, crashed to the ground following the explosion of the gasoline tank. Associated Press dispatches of the tragedy having been confirmed by a telegram received Friday morning by Colonel McCully, Colonel and Mrs. McCully left Greenville at 2:19 A. M. Friday afternoon for San Antonio. Cadet McCully was flying with Lieutenant S. A. Frisvold, flying instructor for Kelly Field, when the plane crashed, killing both. The crash was several thousand feet above the field. Lieutenant Frisvold was instructing Cadet McCully in night flying. The gasoline tank burst. Tongues of flame enveloped the plane. The "boom" caused the wings soon ignited and a landing was impossible. The plane began falling. Control was lost. A crash on the field was heard. Assistance hurried to the spot, but too late. Only the smoldering ashes of the plane, machine and the two dead bodies of the cadet and instructor lay on a prairie when found.

The grand jury of York county in its report last week called the attention of the court to the great number of petty parties that escape with punishment that is entirely too light in some instances. They laugh about the sentences and go on to say "It is discouraging to a hard-fighting officer to see the guilty escape unpunished when he has discharged his duty in apprehending the criminal and procured the evidence of his guilt." There's no chance whatever that the bootlegger will ever be broken up as long as fines are imposed. With the huge profit to be made out of illicit traffic in liquor the fine is a mere pittance. The grand jury and the court can pay an enormous fine and never miss the money. But when a few of these drones and scoundrels are put to work on the county chain gang there will be a different song. The judges of South Carolina have it within their power to break up the liquor business, and to reduce it to a minimum by the proper display of back bone and common sense.

## General News Notes

The Pennsylvania state board of pardons has refused to commute the death sentence of Wylie Morgan, a degenerate, who more than a year ago murdered a six-year-old child in Philadelphia.

John M. Moore, deposed as president of the Fidelity National Bank & Trust company of Kansas City, ten days ago, on the discovery of an alleged shortage in the bank's funds of \$600,000; died at his home in that city Thursday night after being unconscious for several days.

Nikola Guenoff walked into the American consulate at Sofia, Bulgaria, Friday, asked the consul certain questions, and then jumping to his feet, shouted: "This is American soil!" shot himself to death. His object being that he might leave his fortune to the Macedonian cause, and dying on American soil was the only way this could be accomplished. On his person was found 50,000 levas, (Bulgarian money) and \$4,000 in American currency.

Mary E. Lebar, aged 99 years, smoking a pipe, walked into the county treasurer's office of Monroe county, Pa., Friday and applied for a fishing license. She is said to be the oldest angler in the state. She said she had been smoking a pipe 75 years.

Mabel Walker, Willebrandt, assistant attorney general of the United States, in an address before the Daughters of the American Revolution in Washington Friday, made an appeal to the Daughters for them to get behind the enforcement of all laws, and especially the prohibition laws of the country. She told her hearers that there is much danger to America from the law violators inside the country as there is from enemies outside.

Governor Smith of New York has pardoned Gussie Humann, sent to Auburn prison about two years ago for a term of seven to fifteen years for perjury in trying to help her sweetheart and the father of her unborn child escape a charge of murder by swearing to an alibi. Her child was born in the Auburn prison.

During the session of the Federal court, Judge E. Yates Webb, presiding, which closed in Charlotte Saturday afternoon, 74 defendants were fined and 55 were sent to prison. A large number of the convictions were for violation of the liquor laws. Two firemen were killed at Montclair, N. C., Saturday when they came in contact with a radio aerial wire that had blown across an electric power wire carrying a voltage of 2,400 volts. The charged wire was finally broken by another fireman who grasped the wire with her bare hands and snapped it.

Fifteen persons in Chicago are under the care of doctors following a supper party Friday night. The doctors think the fifteen are victims of glass poisoning, and Ella Redlich, a discharged maid, is held on suspicion of doing the poisoning.

Yeggmen cracked the safe in a New York cafe early Saturday morning and got away with \$20,000 in cash. The safe was cracked with crow bars and other pieces of steel.

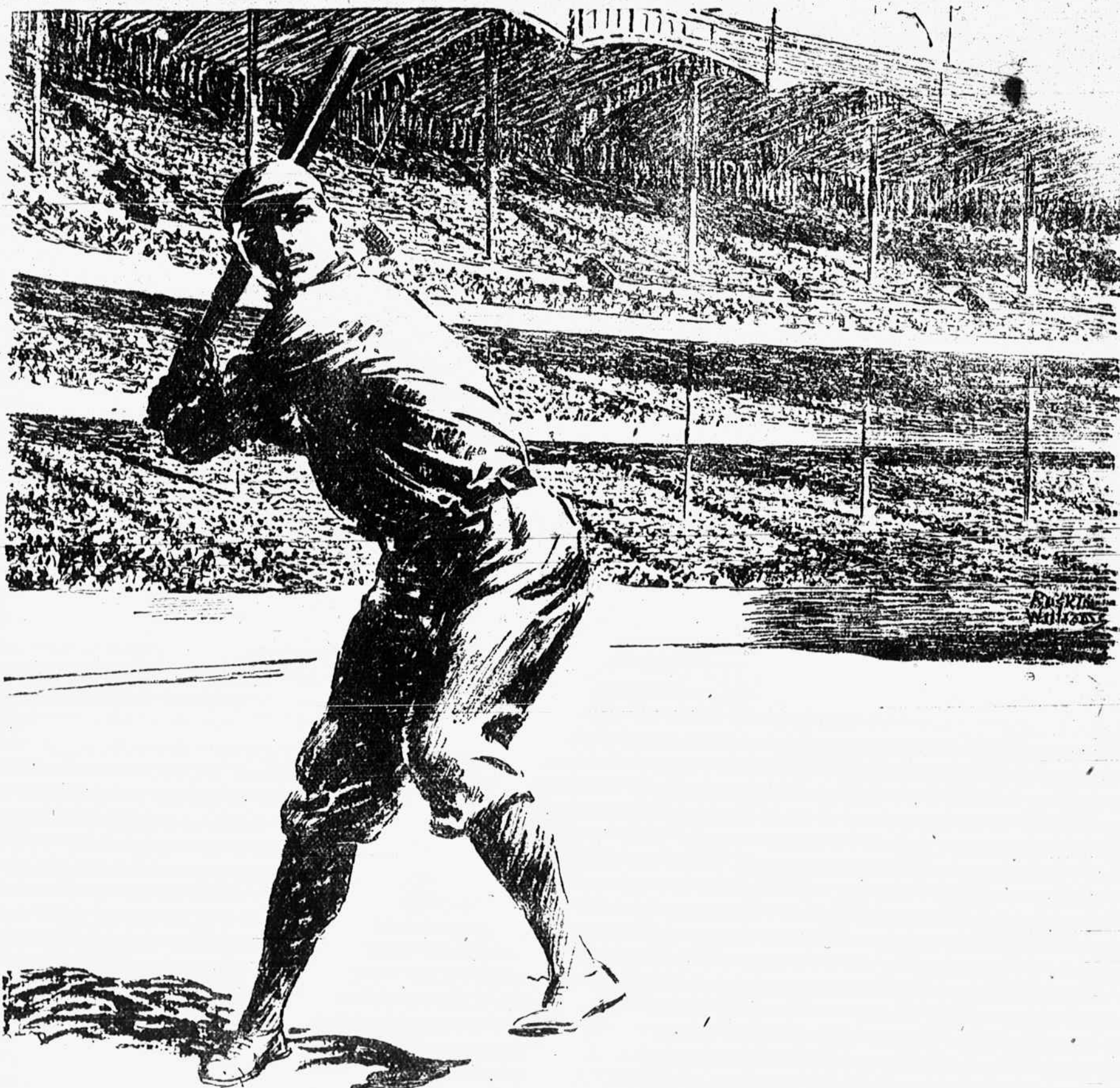
