figure in the community. He was of a distinct type. Outspoken and uncompromising in his convictions and maintenance of his position on any question when once right in the premises, he nevertheless was tolerant and broadminded and accorded to others the right to their views and to free expression of their opinions. Honesty and integrity, thrift and economy characterized his life. He took no stock in the fads and fables of the passing day; his interest and his conversations were ever centered in things more worth while and he had no patience with shams and pretenses, yet he loved to mingle with and laugh and play and joke with his fellowmen. While magnifying the serious matters of life, he was an optimist and a preacher of the gospel of sunshine.
"For years he had been recognized as one of the leading members of the local Rotary Club, and it is only truth to say that no man in that band was held in higher esteem by its membership nor was there one who believed more firmly in its doctrines of 'service above self' nor yet one who evoked more hearty rounds of laughter at the weekly luncheons."

DEATH OF E. W. PARKER

Prominent Citizen of Dalzell Community Passes Away.

Dalzell, May 19.—Mr. E. W. Parker, prominent farmer, died at his home here Saturday night at 10:30 o'clock, from an illness which extended over a period of nearly two months.

Mr. Parker died in his 78th year. He was born in Kershaw county, S. C., June 15, 1837. He later moved to Ridgeway, S. C., where he spent the greater part of his life. About twenty-six years ago he moved to Dalzell, Sumter county, S. C., where he lived until his death. In December, 1860, he was married to Miss Emma Walker, of Camden, S. C. To this union were born 16 children, three of whom died in infancy.

In May, 1898, Mr. Parker lost his wife and in December, 1899, he was married to Miss Margaret Stroud, of Chester. He is survived by his widow and the following daughters: Mrs. John H. Steele and Mrs. R. H. Hope of Rock Hill; Mrs. Mattie Mayer, of Dalzell; Mrs. D. R. McCallum, of Sumter. Also the following sons: J. E. Parker, Rock Hill; J. M. Parker, Dalzell; E. W. and L. L. Parker, of Holly Hill; H. E. and T. H. Parker, of Sumter; J. S. Parker, of Ridgeway; A. B. Parker, of Dillon, and Eli Parker of Eastover. In addition to his sons and daughters, he leaves forty grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

Colored Woman Dead.

Elizabeth Rainey, the wife of Abraham Rainey, died at her home in the northern part of the city last Thursday afternoon, after quite a long illness. She was a good colored woman and was known and highly respected by a large number of our people. She was the mother of nine children. The funeral of the woman was held from Mount Moriah Baptist Church Sunday afternoon, she being a member of that church.

Abraham Rainey, husband of the woman, is in receipt of the following letter of sympathy from a friend in Washington, D. C., which he appreciates very highly and asks that we reproduce same:

"Our hearts go out in deepest sympathy to you and the children in your great loss, for your wife was ever a faithful and loving companion to you and a most devoted mother to her children. Words are inadequate to express our grief, but we hope the Heavenly Father will send you strength to bear this bereavement, for His will be done. 'No one knows the silent heartaches. Only those who have lost can tell Of the grief that is borne in silence For the ones we loved so well.'"

Death of Samuel H. Hilton.
