**TRAGEDY OF FRIENDSHIP**  
Judge Who Condemns Prisoner to Death Gets His Money.

Dublin, Oct. 21.—When Rory O'Connor was condemned to death and later shot in December, 1922, for complicity in the Four Courts coup in Dublin, Free State Minister of Justice O'Higgins, who ordered his execution, had to choose between friendship and duty, it was learned recently.

O'Connor was a close friend of Mr. O'Higgins and had acted as his best man at the latter's wedding only six months before the sentence of death was passed. Mr. O'Higgins, although every effort was made to have him agree to save his friend, refused to grant reprieve.

The agonizing struggle between duty and friendship completely overcame Mr. O'Higgins, but perhaps the most dramatic feature of all was when the dead man's will was opened and it was discovered that he had left all his money to the minister of justice.

The death penalty was inflicted yesterday in Switzerland for the first time in 22 years, says a Berne, Switzerland dispatch of Thursday. At Atdorf, capital of the Canton of Uri, Clement Bernet was guillotined for the murder of a young girl who surprised him while in the act of burglary. There is no official executioner in Uri and the authorities had difficulty in finding anyone to carry out the sentence. A train hand who offered to do the job for 500 francs, was forbidden by the federal railroad management when other employes threatened to strike if he were allowed to "cast discredit" upon them. At the last moment a mechanic was induced to pull the trigger releasing the knife. Bernet was the least concerned person at the execution. Becoming converted while in prison he refused an appeal for commutation, and, as he approached the scaffold, he tore the black hood from his head exclaiming: "My victim stared death in the face; it is but just that I do likewise."
