Will Defend Motor Title Law

Columbia, January 17.—Introduction in the senate this week of a bill to repeal the motor vehicle registration law led Representative James O. Sheppard of Edgefield county, to issue a statement here tonight defending the act and setting out reasons for its continued existence. The recent reduction of 10 per cent in all automobile theft insurance rates in South Carolina was attributed by the Edgefield representative directly to the operation of the registration law, which went into effect on the first day of the year. "It becomes practically impossible under the law to dispose of a stolen motor vehicle in South Carolina, and to that extent it discourages the operations of professional motor thieves within the borders of our state," he declared. Representative Sheppard stated that under the law sheriffs and chiefs of police are required to report to the state highway department thefts of motor vehicles, and the department is required to report in turn to every licensing agency in the United States the theft of any motor vehicle in South Carolina. "I learned from the state highway department that as a result of new systems initiated in the compilation of its records and with the use of improved equipment provided for under this act, that the department will be enabled hereafter to furnish to the state tax commission at practically no cost complete records of motor vehicles registered and licensed in the 46 counties of the state. Such records will be turned over to the auditors of the respective counties for comparison with returns made in the counties for purposes of taxation, and it is confidently believed that this system will result in the placing of thousands of motor vehicles on the tax books which hitherto have escaped taxation." The bill to repeal the motor title law was introduced in the senate by Senator John Howard Moore of Abbeville. Representative Sheppard sponsored the existing law in the house and Senator D. M. Crosson of Lexington, in the senate.

Death of Mr. D. L. Davis

Mr. D. L. Davis, age 72, a former resident of Lee county, died at his home near Clinton, N. C., Thursday January 8th, after an illness of about ten weeks. His death was not unexpected as he had been in ill health for several years. During all of his intense suffering he never grumbled or complained, bearing it as he had borne the burdens of life, with patience and fortitude, having great faith in the God he served and the reward hereafter for those who do His will. Funeral services were conducted at his home by his pastor, who gave a brief account of his useful life, characterizing him as a fearless man of God whose life had been a living example of Christian faith and duty. Burial took place at the Clinton cemetery where the Masons performed the last rites. Mr. Davis was reared in Lee county, where he was a successful farmer, having moved to Clinton, N. C., about 14 years ago. Had he lived seven days longer, he would have been married 52 years, to Miss Mary Eliza Arrants of Camden, S. C. He is survived by his wife and two sons McD. Davis and T. A. Davis both of Clinton, N. C. Mr. Davis will be remembered by the older residents of Camden and vicinity where he has numerous friends and relatives.

Dies at the Wheel

M. H. McElwee, president of the Consolidated Lumber Co., of Cowards and prominent lumber man of Statesville, N. C., dropped dead at Cowards this afternoon at 4:15 while driving his Dodge coupe. He was accompanied by E. L. Montgomery, cashier of the Bank of Cowards.

Mr. Montgomery noticed the car skid sharply to the right almost running into a wagon. He reached for the wheel and cut the car the other way. The body of Mr. McElwee falling over on the shoulder of Mr. Montgomery.

The body was shipped to Statesville, N. C., for burial.

Mr. McElwee recently purchased \$100,000 worth of timber in the Cowards section and his big mill had just begun operation. The terrible auto wreck of the day before had unnerved the lumber man happening in a few hundred feet of his mill. He knew both Mr. Whitehead and Mr. Stalvey and was on the scene shortly after the accident. Mr. McElwee was 59 years of age.—Florence News-Review, January 15.

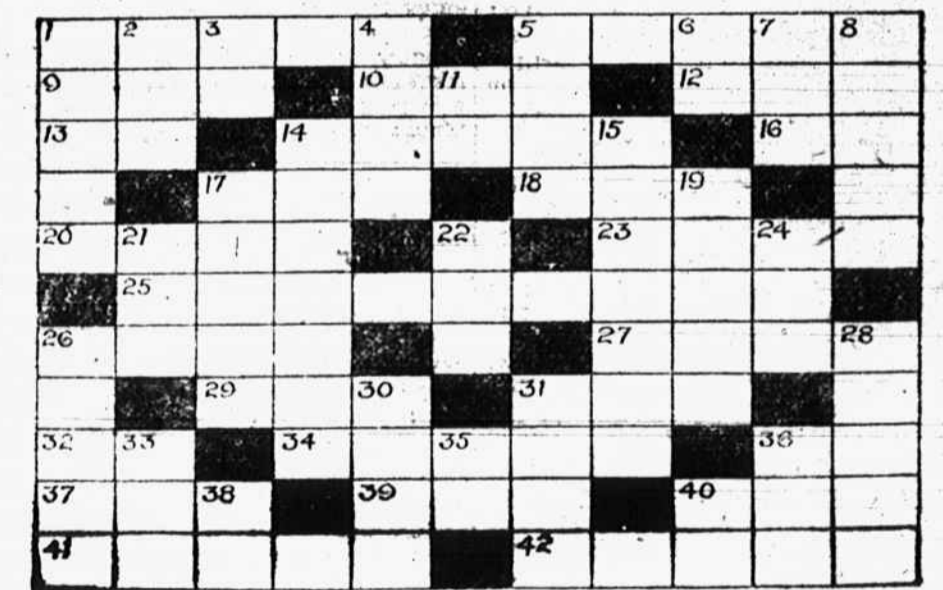
