Caldwell's Body Found

Miami, Flas, June 5 .- Led by a negro ditch digger police this afternoon discovered the body of A. C. Caldwell, who killed his daughter's husband and wounded the girl on their wedding day. The body was lying in a palmetto thicket within seventy-five feet of the place where the tragedy occurred. Caldwell evidently had taken his own life within a few hours of the shooting. A revolver was found beside the body.

Caldwell trailed the couple as they started on a honeymoon within a few hours of the marriage, May 13, and overtaking them forced the car into a ditch, ordered the companions of the young couple to flee at the point of his revolver, then turned the weapon on his daughter and her husband. Eugene Hawkins died at once. The young wife recovered and accompanied the body of her husband to his former home in Kenosha.
