CLUB INSTITUTE FOR WOMEN

To Be Held at Winthrop From June 22 to July 4th

From June 22 to July 4 there will be held at Winthrop College a Club Institute for women. All club women in the state, whether members of federated clubs or not, are cordially invited to attend. Organized in 1916 as a short course for club women, the work of the institute has grown year after year, including a definite program for the advancement of club life. This year especial emphasis will be placed upon the three lines of work outlined by the General Federation: club organization, club relations and club ethics.

To further this end, daily conferences led by chairmen of the various departments of the State Federation will be held. Free discussion of club problems will be encouraged.

Prominent among the features scheduled for this institute are courses in citizenship, conducted by Prof. Wm. G. Burgin, professor of Political Science, Winthrop College; public speaking, Miss Florence Mims; child welfare, Miss Minnie Macfeet and in junior work, Mrs. J. M. Patterson. Among the miscellaneous subjects offered will be religious education, a course in story telling, Mrs. H. E. Tralle; school improvement work, with Miss Mattie Thomas, state community organizer, as instructor; and Parent-Teacher Association work, Mrs. George Lutz, state president, instructor; English, a course in the presentation of news, by Dr. Minnie Claire Yarbrough, head of the department of English, Wheaton college.

On June 23, Dr. James A. Hayne will address the club women on "The Activities of the State Board of Health." From June 24-26 other members of the state board of health, Mrs. L. L. Caine, Miss Ada Taylor Graham, Miss Bess Dalton, Dr. L. A. Riser and Miss Nellie Cunningham, will speak on various phases of the health program of the state.

On June 29 Mr. Ellison Capers, assistant secretary of the State Board of Public Welfare, will present a survey of the social and industrial conditions existing in the state today. This survey to be followed by a round table discussion.

One of the most popular instructors of the institute is Mrs. Emma A. Fox, noted parliamentarian and author. Mrs. Fox will conduct a class in parliamentary law, which this year has been scheduled for a late afternoon hour so as to allow attendance by all the club women. Immediately after supper each evening Mrs. Fox will lead a parliamentary law drill on the piazza of the infirmary.

Among the informal pleasures in store for these club women, in addition to meeting old friends and making new acquaintances, are the afternoon coffee parties, for which Winthrop is well known; a drive over the city by representatives of the local chamber of commerce; the privilege of cooling dip at any time in the green and white tiled swimming pool of the Peabody gymnasium, located conveniently near their dormitory; the shady campus and the broad piazzas of the infirmary, which building will be reserved as a whole for those in attendance.

President and Mrs. Johnson will entertain at a formal reception in honor of these guests at some time during their stay at Winthrop.

Since all offerings of the Summer School are open to those in attendance on the Club Institute, many will doubtless wish to visit certain classes not on their schedule, but which for them hold some particular interest. Of particular interest is a series of special classes which come during the period of the Club Institute and which will be taught by Prof. Richard E. Burton, head of the Department of English, University of Minnesota. These courses include the study of Browning's poetry and the modern drama.

Club women are invited to attend all lectures and entertainments to be held in the auditorium during the open hour from twelve to one and also in the evening. Among the well-known lecturers and readers who will occupy these hours during the period of the Club Institute are: Dr. Henry Edward Tralle of New York City, author and specialist in religious education, June 22, 23, 26 and 27; Frederick D. Losey, author, lecturer, dramatic reader and Shakespearean critic, June 24-25; John Langdon-Davies of Oxford University, journalist and lecturer on social psychology and anthropology, June 29-July 4.

Cost of attendance on the Club Institute is only that of board—\$10.00 per week, or \$2.00 per day for a stay of shorter duration. There are no registration fees. All those who expect to attend should notify at once Miss Leta A. Russell, Chairman Club Institute, Winthrop College, Rock Hill, S. C.

Escaped Convict Is Captured

Officer J. D. Chandler late yesterday afternoon effected the capture of Bob Hayes, negro escaped from the Allendale chain gang, where he was serving a four year term for violation of the prohibition law, on May 27. Mr. Chandler saw this negro near New Sumter Tuesday and thought he was the negro advertised as wanted. He came on to Sumter and got the picture of Hayes and returned to the place where he had seen him. Diligent search all day long failed to bring him to light. Wednesday Mr. Adam Reams notified Mr. Chandler that he thought he had the negro wanted working for him. Mr. Chandler went to his place and when the negro came into the lot after his day's work arrested him. He at first denied that he was Bob Hayes but under further questioning admitted his identity. Allendale officers were notified of his capture and came to Sumter, getting here early this morning. They paid the reward of \$300 to Mr. Chandler and took the prisoner back to finish his sentence. Mr. Chandler and Mr. Reams will split the reward for the negro's capture.—Thursday's Sumter Item.

Marriage Licenses High Across Line

Marriage license fees in North Carolina were considerably increased at the last session of that state's legislature. Monday the new license fees became effective. It now costs \$6 in fees to be married in North Carolina. Formerly the fee was \$3, but now the state's new revenue call requires \$3 for the state treasury, \$1 goes to the register of deeds and \$1 to the county. Added to this is the certificate fee of \$1. The doctor's health certificate required by law boosts the price still higher.

Caldwell's Body Found

Miami, Fla., June 5.—Led by a negro ditch digger police this afternoon discovered the body of A. C. Caldwell, who killed his daughter's husband and wounded the girl on their wedding day. The body was lying in a palmetto thicket within seventy-five feet of the place where the tragedy occurred. Caldwell evidently had taken his own life within a few hours of the shooting. A revolver was found beside the body.

Caldwell trailed the couple as they started on a honeymoon within a few hours of the marriage, May 13, and overtaking them forced the car into a ditch, ordered the companions of the young couple to flee at the point of his revolver, then turned the weapon on his daughter and her husband. Eugene Hawkins died at once. The young wife recovered and accompanied the body of her husband to his former home in Kenosha.
