Mr. Floyd went to Spartanburg 52 years ago with his father from Yorkville and grew up with the place from a small hamlet to a large city. He did not offer for reelection and is succeeded by Mayor Ben H. Brown.

Ellison, former treasurer of Greenwood county has been granted bond in the sum of \$5,000 after being under arrest by a grand jury warrant charging him with "taking and carrying away" \$55,121.84 of the county's money for his own personal use while he was treasurer during the years 1922 and 1925.
