Robt. Gaskins accidentally kills Eddie Doby while practicing with rifle by torchlight.

A. H. Seabrook, a merchant of Camden, goes to Columbia to take editorial management of The Columbia Record.

A. Jeff Gregory, of Kershaw, shoots and badly wounds W. T. Catoe, a former policeman.

David Williams, a three-year convict on the State Farm, accidentally killed by M. O. Bartlett, a guard.

E. B. Capers, well known shoe merchant of Camden, dies suddenly at his home on DeKalb street. Pallbearers serving were F. L. Zemp, W. H. Zemp, E. C. Zemp, F. M. Zemp, S. C. Zemp and Dr. W. S. Stokes.

W. J. Duffie, one of the wealthiest men in South Carolina, died in Columbia. He was a school book publisher and invested his earnings in Columbia real estate and owned 25,000 acres in Oconee county.

Death of Mr. W. H. Yarbrough

Bethune, S. C., Nov. 30.—Mr. W. H. Yarbrough, of near Bethune, died at his home Saturday about 12 o'clock. Mr. Yarbrough had been in poor health for some time and while his death was not unexpected still it came as a great shock to his family and friends. Interment was at the Scotch cemetery Sunday at 11 o'clock, the funeral services being conducted by Dr. Sullivan.

Chain Store Tax Is Again Upheld

Washington, Nov. 30.—For the third time in the year, chain stores today received bad news from the Supreme court—this time in a decision upholding the Virginia tax on warehouses which distribute to more than one store.

Lawyers of the Great Atlantic and Pacific company argued their case was different from those decided by the court in approving Indiana and North Carolina chain store taxes.

The court did not think so, however. Chief Justice Hughes, in announcing that the decree of a lower court which upheld the tax was affirmed, explained that the suit was governed by the court's action in the previous cases. There was no written opinion.

The first of these cases to be passed upon, that of Indiana, is precedent now, but it was decided by the narrowest possible margin, 5 to 4.

Like the Indiana tax on the retail stores themselves, the Virginia levy on warehouses is graduated. It mounts with the number of stores served.

Guard Convicted of Manslaughter

York, Nov. 30.—Guilty of involuntary manslaughter was the verdict returned by the jury tonight in the case of Roy Sapp, former York county chaingang guard, in connection with the killing September 27 of J. E. Bridges, Rock Hill automobile mechanic.

The killing took place at the chaingang camp where Bridges was repairing a truck. Sapp was handling a pistol when it was discharged. There had been no semblance of a quarrel between the two men. Officers testified that after the killing Sapp appeared to be under the influence of an intoxicant.

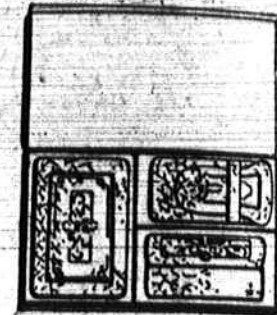

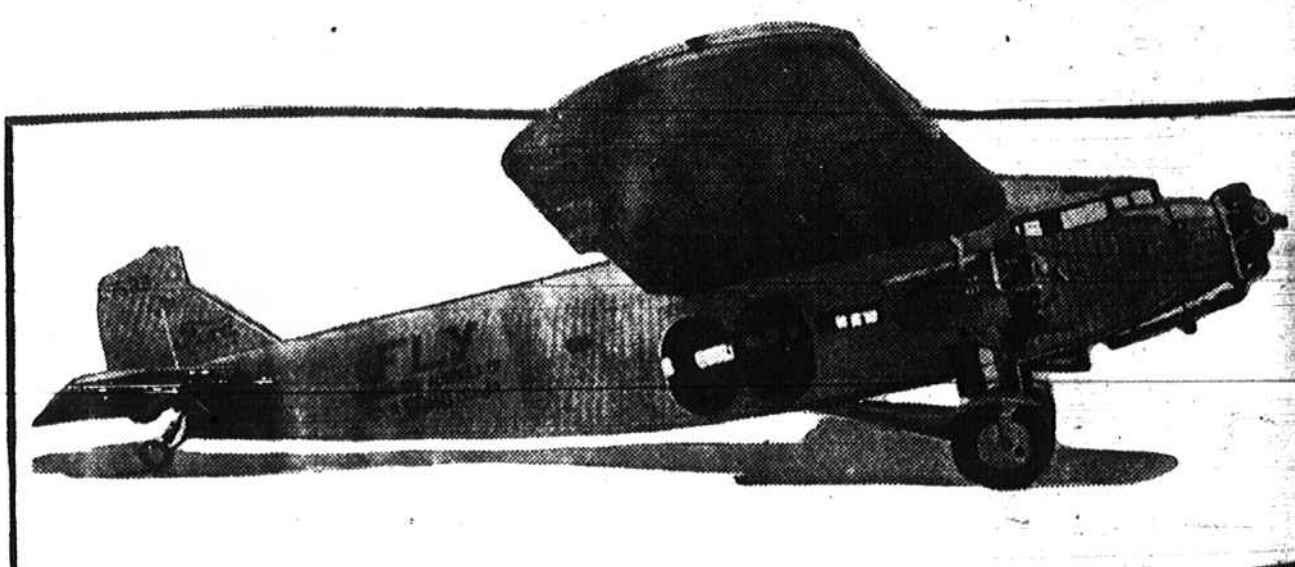
