Chapin's Death Instantaneous Is Report Of Tragedy

Young Fighter Pilot, Well Known Here, Was In Formation at Time

According to Baltimore papers the death of Major John M. Chapin, pilot of a P-80 Shooting Star, which caught fire in the air and plunged into the Maryland hillside, was instantaneous.

The press reports that advice from Langley Field, where Major Chapin was stationed, indicate that he was piloting the jet propelled plane in a formation of seven planes when the officer in charge of the group noticed Chapin's plane was getting out of line.

Suddenly it was enveloped in flames and then crashed. In crashing the momentum was so great that it dug a crater some four to five feet in depth.

Wreckage was scattered over a wide area and fabric from the plane was later seen hanging to the branches of trees.

A Baltimore paper carries a picture of the place where the crash occurred.

Major Chapin's body was taken to Portland, Maine, where funeral services and interment took place.

Later Mrs. Chapin, who was the former Mary Zemp, with her two months old son, will come to Camden to be with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Zemp, Fair street.

Packing a Salad
