CAMDEN ALL-STARS PLAY FAMED MULBERRY TEAM. PROVIDENCE MEETS LANCASTER AT BASEBALL PARK

Announcements coming from the head office of the Camden polo club and headquarters of the Providence Chiefs of the New England league today indicate that Sunday will be another sport-packed afternoon for Camden fans.

The polo club announces the "game of the year" between the Camden All-Stars and the famed Mulberry four-pack, to be played on the Kirkwood turf at 3 p. m.

The Providence Chiefs will hold their home game at the Camden ball park, at the fast Lancaster, Pa., Interstate league, game time 2:30 p. m. Last Sunday the Chiefs and the Lynn, Mass., Red Sox

played to a 10 to 8 Providence win before some 1,500 fans, while at the polo arena, the game between the Camden All-Stars and the West Point Military Academy attracted the largest crowd of the polo season.

Manager Cyril Harrison of the polo club stated that he would not be able to name the team personnel for the Sunday game until later in the week. It is definitely certain, however, that the Mulberry lineup will include David R. Williams, Jr., who will fly here from Tulsa to play; Carl Lightfoot, stellar defense ace; Jim Minnick and George Wagner, Minnick is from Augusta, Ga., and fills in for Jack Daniels, Mulberry scoring ace of 1946, who is out west and unable to play in this year's classic. On the Camden All-Star outfit will be Harrison, Kirby Tupper, Sr., and Kirby Tupper, Jr., while a fourth selection will be between Little, Carl and Edgerton.

While the Army-Camden game of last Sunday set a new mark for attendance, it is believed the Camden-Mulberry affair will attract an even greater throng.

Something About The Racing Bill For Palmetto State

Measure Will Bar Minors From Race Track—Facts About Act

The bill creating a state horse racing commission and establishing a pari-mutuel system which has so far progressed favorably with the lawmakers at Columbia, has naturally evoked much discussion in Camden, one of the leading horse race centers in the Palmetto state.

Facts in regard to the bill are being eagerly sought, as press reports of the measure have been somewhat meager.

The bill was brought up for discussion before the house when its author, J. Ralph Gasque of Marion asked if it be made a special order for the day. This was a sudden surprise move and more surprisingly there was little if any objection to it. This moved the bill from its designated place on the calendar and it was ready for immediate action.

The bill sets up a three-man horse-racing commission whose expenses would be paid out of the pari-mutuel system they regulate. Before a race track could be operated in any township the bill provides that an election must be held to determine whether or not the residents of the particular township wish it to be located there. The expense of such an election would be paid by the person or corporation which proposed to construct such a track.

Within the enclosure of any race track licensed under the provision of the bill, the sale of pari-mutuel pools would be authorized. The sale of such pools would not be legal outside of the race track grounds. Pari-mutuel operators would receive 17 per cent of the amount paid in, of which 5 per cent would go to the state and 2 per cent would be deposited in the general fund of the county in which the races take place.

The remainder of the pool would be distributed among those placing their bets on the race. The bill also provides that any one in financing a race would be subject to a fine up to \$10,000 or a prison term up to ten years. No minors would be permitted to attend the races or be employed in any manner about the race track.

CAMDEN OBSERVES ITS 50th GOLF BIRTHDAY THIS YEAR; CLUB HAS LARGE MEMBERSHIP

City Will Observe Fiftieth Anniversary of Advent of Polo Here Next Year

Camden is celebrating its 50th year of golf. That is a remarkable record for a small town, for a half century ago only a few of the largest cities of America boasted of golf.

There will be celebrations of various kinds for the 50th birthday of golf and the first is the tournament to decide the Camden club champion player.

About 50 players have been entered so far, and it is expected there will be enough to fill four groups of 16 players each. The 16 lowest qualifying scores will compose the first bracket and the winner of that bracket automatically becomes the club champion. The next 16 players will enter the second bracket, and so on until four brackets will be listed. Suitable prizes will be given winners of the other three brackets and there will be consolation prizes also.

The Country club now has more Camden players than at any time in the history of local golf, and in addition, there are a large number of the tourist colony who are members. They also will participate in the club championship matches.

John M. Villepique is president of the club and he has an able group of assistants who are working hard to keep the local course one of the best in this section of the south.

In the recent pro-amateur tournament, many of the leading professionals from South Carolina, North Carolina, Georgia and Virginia were amazed to find such a fine championship layout, and were lavish in their praise of the course.

Steve Duda, a professional, formerly of Hemstead, Long Island, N. Y., is in charge of the course and club house, and he has as his steward, Robert Dureen, who has had 30 years experience with golf clubs.

WARNING

Motorists who follow fire trucks to and from fires, or drive their cars within three hundred feet of any fire, are to be arrested and prosecuted under the provisions of Sub-Section D. D. Section 62 of the city ordinances.

"That it shall be unlawful to drive any vehicle, on any block in the City of Camden where fire is being fought, within three hundred feet of said fire. No vehicles are allowed to follow a fire truck beyond the speed limit, and to approach within five hundred feet of said truck when going to or returning from a fire."

Violators of this section will be arrested and fined.
