National Publicity Given To Contest To Select Nurse

National publicity for the nurse recruitment program in North Carolina and for the organizations which helped make the Miss N. C. Student Nurse of 1949 program a success was received this week as the first June issue of "Look" magazine was distributed featuring a comprehensive article titled "The Nursing Shortage Can Be Solved." "Look", which has a readership of over 17,000,000, states that North Carolina has solved the problem of enlisting student nurses as a result of the Miss N. C. Student Nurse program sponsored annually by the Good Health Association with the help of the

Nurses' Association, the League of Nursing Education, Medical Society, Hospital Association and Hospital Savings Association.

Realizing the far-reaching effects of this humanitarian program to bolster the ranks of the North Carolina nursing profession, the World Travel Service of the Carolina Motor Club offered a vacation trip to Bermuda as grand prize for the lucky winner of the coveted title this year. The Carolina Motor Club also offered a similar trip to the person chosen by Miss Student Nurse as champion. "Look" recognized this addition to the contest as a valuable incentive to the program and reported the grand award as follows: "After her selection as 'Miss North Carolina Student Nurse', Juanita Mae Lee of Durham plunged into a two-weeks recruit-

ment tour of the state to tell high school girls of the merits of nursing as profession. After that job, she and her mother had a free round-trip early in May via DC-4 to Bermuda, arranged by the Carolina Motor Club via Colonial Airlines, and a free stay at Harmony Hall in Pigeon, Bermuda. To help Juanita get ready for her trip, the Raleigh Merchants Bureau donated a beach wardrobe from 15 local stores. Another prize is a \$150 scholarship for post-graduate study in nursing education."
