In the long ago, as the story goes, there lived a potentate who exercised unlimited power and enjoyed an immense wealth. Although a high roller, hedged in by courtiers and flatterers, he was wise enough to appoint a trustworthy servant to the daily task of reminding him that there was a hereafter.

It seems to us that President Cleveland, surrounded as he is by Massachusetts theorists and New York specialists, needs counsel as to public feeling from those who do not court his favor, and who are not soured by the disappointment of failure in the scramble for office. We, therefore, volunteer the unpleasant task of talking the plain English of the situation in South Carolina to the Chief Executive of these United States.

A Capital Letter.
Editor People:
The farmers in this community are progressing very well with their crops. The weather is very favorable for them at present. They are looking well and are generally in good fix, although I heard one man say that he thought he would plow up his cotton and plant over to get rid of the grass. But that is not general. I heard another say that he had been out in his cotton patch, hunting for worms, and that he thought he had found some. But I think that it was the form of a stalk which he thought happens to it by the last of August, will develop a pretty fair stalk.

Well now for my plan for saving pea vines hay. Three years ago I was cutting and curing the hay when an old neighbor came over to spend the day with me, and very soon after the clouds looked very threatening. I said to him that I was afraid that I would lose my hay. He told me to go and stack it. I said, not green. He said it would not hurt if it stacked as he said. I went and stacked it, and when there came a little rain, I said to him that it was a very heavy cloud coming on behind the shower. He told me to go and stack it. Well I thought that it would be worth nothing if much rain came on it as it was, so I went and stacked it with the weather coming on in the morning and it was a fine hay. This was in August and in February following I hauled it as bright and fine hay as ever I saw and I have followed that plan successfully ever since, with just the pea vines, and when they are mixed with grass, and have not had any more of it since, and it don't shed the leaves in handling.

THE PLAN.
Procure your pole same as for cider, but in trimming leave about two feet apart limbs two to three feet long. Have your pole as high as you can well throw the vines with forks. Place brush or something under to hold them off the ground, then pack in between the limbs holding the vines against the over ends of the limbs. Keep smoothing on edge so as to turn water. Fill your pole covering top of pole and as they set the limbs will hold the vines up enough in centre to admit enough air to cure the vines.
