Texas must be a bad country. Four gold families that emigrated to that State from Greenville a year ago returned to the Piedmont escarpment last week.

Some fellow in West Virginia has begun the free coinage of silver on his own account and in spite of Congress. His dollars are a little over weight and are quite as popular as Uncle Sam's coins.

The Commissioner of Patents has decided to appeal from the decision of Judge Bradley in the matter of making the Palmetto tree the trade mark of the South Carolina Dispensary. He has taken steps to carry the case to the United States Court of Appeals.

Now, Mr. President Cleveland, you have conquered Congress and what are you going to recommend in your message the first week in December? The responsibility is solely yours. You saw and the Democratic party will reap the crop.

It behooves everybody to be saving these hard times, but those who can afford to go to the State Fair or Augusta Exposition will spend time and money profitably. It will brighten any one to mix with the multitude and to see what progress the State and the South are making. We enjoy a day at the State Fair more than we do a week at home.

'White Caps' from North Georgia to Texas have posted night notices warning gin owners that their gins would be burned if they began glining before cotton advanced to ten cents a pound. Some buildings have been burned. The farmers threaten the 'white caps' with extermination if caught. Such conduct is damaging to prices. Eastern buyers argue that the heavy receipts in spite of such obstruction indicate a bigger crop than the experts figure up.

The United States Senate on Monday, by a vote of 43 to 32, repealed the purchasing clause of the Sherman Act. Senators Butler and Fry voted against repeal. On the vote 20 Democrats were recorded in favor of the measure and nineteen against it. Three of the five who were paired were against the measure. If all had voted the Democrats would have been equally divided, 22 on each side.

The result was reached after 61 days of debate, during which about twenty million words were talked, without changing a vote. It remains to be seen what the result will be. If the promised easing up of hard times does not come quickly for a long stay there is going to be quiet in the air.

Saturday night just before 8 o'clock Eugene Patrick Frendergast, a crank newspaper carrier, rang the door bell of Mayor Carter H. Harrison of Chicago, and told the domestic girl who opened the door that he would like to see the Mayor. He entered the passage and Mr. Harrison hearing him came out of the dining room and walked towards the caller. Without a word Frendergast drew a pistol and fired three shots, each striking Mr. Harrison, two inflicting mortal wounds. Mr. Harrison turned back into the dining room and fell in the father's pantry from loss of blood. In 20 minutes he was dead. Frendergast went to a police station and surrendered himself. He gave as the reason for his mad act that Mayor Harrison had promised to make him corporation counsel and had failed to do so.

Mr. Harrison was a Kentuckian, 68 years old, a second cousin of ex-President Benjamin Harrison, and a millionaire. He was serving his fifth term as Mayor. Had he lived until winter he would have married Miss Annie Hallowell, one of the wealthiest young ladies of New Orleans. She was in the house when he was killed. He had been a Democrat all his days.

Commenting on the frequent lynchings of negroes for the 'usual crime,' the Birmingham Age-Herald says: 'These negroes are not the better class of their race, but are escaped convicts, tramps, thieves, etc., and are ostracized by their own people. Hence we often read that there were a number of colored men in the mob that did the lynching. The way to eradicate an evil is to strike at the root. These vagabonds should be dealt with before they have a chance to convert. Allow us and communities who do adopt the same laws that prevail in Birmingham. The police of this city arrest men who cannot show visible means of support. These vagrants are either put on the streets or sent to jail. By strictly enforcing this rule much crime is prevented.' It is a good rule, and its far more necessary in the country than in the towns. The vagrants require to be better cared for than they are. It is better to put them to work in or out of prison than to lynch them.

A most remarkable story reaches the Jacksonville Metropolis from Chicago. Maroon Conant, the well-known citizen of Mayport, recently visited the office of the Chicago Metropolis and told the editor of his wife and child's tale in Chicago with his wife and child. He carried there about a week ago. On Thursday last he visited Liberty prison, which is an exhibition in that city, and the prison had peculiar interest to him, for he was the first prisoner incarcerated there, having been captured at the battle of Bull Run. On entering the prison he pointed out to his captors the cell where he had slept, and asked permission from the guard to lie down where he had slept years before. On permission being granted he got into a reclining position, and immediately complained of a pain in his ear. On getting up he felt ill and had to go home to bed, from which he never arose, dying last night. The body is now en route to Mayport. Mr. Conant leaves behind his wife and a daughter and a brother. He was for many years a jetty contractor at Mayport.

Dispenser Harman at Lexington has resigned because of the reduction of his salary.

Chief Justice L. E. Blockley of Georgia has been invited to deliver the annual address before the South Carolina State Bar Ass'n.

The next meeting of the S. C. Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church will be held in Rev. J. L. Wilson's charge in this county, in October 1894.

The Savannah Construction Company which built the South Bound railroad, will wind up its affairs within six months, the transfer of the road to the Florida Central and Peninsular having accomplished the purpose for which it was arranged. The company in some three-fourths of the \$2,033,000 of bonds of the South Bound, besides a large amount of land along the line of the road.

The Comptroller-General has decided, as a matter of equity, to recommend to the Legislature to have refunded to the whiskey men one-half of the money, which they were required by County Treasurers to pay for the County and State license for the whole year. By the dispensary law their places of business were closed on the first of July. All the dealers in Barnwell were required to pay the amount charged for the year, and under this recommendation will be entitled to a refund of \$50 each.
