The Texas and Indian Territory cotton crops, which are counted together, are now estimated at two and a half million bales. Picking in Texas is getting under headway. On Saturday Duncan & Co of New York bought at different points in Texas 250 bales of new cotton.

WHALEYS, July 23d 1894.

Corn crops in this section are very fine.

The cotton is tolerably good. Farmers are busy plowing between showers.

The family picnic and barbecue at the residence of Mr. Ervin Givens is said by witnesses to far exceed any thing of the kind they ever witnessed. There were eighty-two persons present, seventy nine of whom were of the family, 54 grand children, one great grand child, together with their parents, making up the total. Those present contend that there is nothing like hard times in this section. The day passed off pleasantly, with songs and frolic and pleasant conversation; without mingling the name of "Timon" or "Buzard" or any other candidate with the chorus. At 1 p. m. we were invited to the table where every thing seemed to be placed to tempt the appetite. The supply of the very finest provisions as fully sufficient and would have sufficed the crowd for three days. Ice cream and cake were served at three o'clock until all were satisfied.

The school here has been in progress for eight months without vacation until the present. For the benefit of both school and teacher we have vacation of a few weeks.

The school at Reaves Creek, near Whaley's P. O. has been successfully progressing for eight months, but for the benefit of teacher and scholars there is at present a short vacation but according to an item which is often quoted there is no rest for the wicked. The teacher has been induced to spend his vacation in New Forest Academy where he takes charge of about 25 pupils during the eight weeks of vacation at Reaves Creek.

PATRONS.

Hubbard, Price & Co., of New York, say in their last week's review:

At this period of the plant's growth, the cotton crop appears to be the best advantage, and if the prospect of the plant in the month of July were realized, the crop each year would be an enormous one. But it usually happens that from this time forward the plant undergoes a series of injuries from many different causes, which reduce the yield. Therefore, the question for the cotton man to decide is, not whether the present prospects of the yield are to be realized, but in what extent they will fall short of the present promise.

As a result of the crops of the past two years and the reduction in the visible and invisible supply of cotton, which has taken place throughout the world, the price of the poor condition of

trade, first in Europe and then in the United States, it is believed that a crop of 8,000,000 bales is absolutely necessary to prevent any further reduction in the visible supply of American cotton. The question to decide is how much the present crop will exceed that figure or how much it will fall short, and a decision regarding this question will determine whether cotton is cheap or not. If the crop prospects fall off and the crop is thought to be less than 8,000,000 bales, it goes without saying that cotton will advance to a permanently higher range of value, and if, on the other hand, the promise of the crop is for a yield of 9,000,000, the price of cotton will fall to a very low point. At present it may be very good, as the crop prospects are very good, as they usually are at this season. In America a slight improvement in trade conditions is noticeable, and with a settlement of the tariff question, which seems likely within the next two weeks, the improvement in trade, we believe, will proceed at an increasing ratio.

First Campaign Blood.

Deputy Sheriff R. R. Branham of Columbia was the first victim of the campaign meetings of this year of grace. On Saturday week ago he attended a county campaign meeting at Eastover, Richland county. Sam Joyner, a young white man of that neighborhood, was there, under the influence of liquor, and having seen that the deputy sheriff was after him. He tried to pick a fuss with Mr. Branham, who took Joyner's pistol and kept it in self defence. Joyner went to his home, got a shot gun, returned and when thirty yards from Branham shot him, lodging over 100 shots in his body. Death followed in a few days. Joyner was put in Richland jail, but threats of lynching having been made, the Governor had him removed to the Penitentiary for safe keeping.

Attention Reformers.

To the Reform Voters of Barnwell County: To carry out the plan adopted by the State Reform Executive Committee for the nomination of candidates for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, by the "Reform" faction of the Democratic party in the general primary to be held on the 28th day of August next, all "Reform" members of the various Democratic clubs in Barnwell county are hereby directed to meet at the meeting for the registration of clubs on the 11th day of August next at 4 o'clock p. m.

Having assembled themselves together as above directed, said club shall select three of its members to act as managers of election and proceed to vote by ballot for their choice for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, and for the delegates to represent their club in the County "Reform" Convention.

Said clubs shall also instruct their delegates as to whether or not they are in favor of the delegates to the State "Reform" Convention voting for the nomination of a full set of State officers, besides Governor and Lieutenant Governor, to represent the "Reformers" in the general primary.

Each club will be entitled to one delegate at large, and one delegate for every 25 "Reform" members or majority fraction thereof.

The candidate for Governor and Lieutenant Governor receiving the largest number of votes in said club election shall be voted for by the delegates representing said club in the County "Reform" Convention.

The County "Reform" Convention to which the delegates from the various clubs are elected will meet at Barnwell on the 12th day of August next at 12 o'clock m. at the Court House.

Only those members of the Democratic clubs in this county who are "Reformers" are to be allowed to vote at the aforesaid club election; that is, those "Reformers" who voted for the "Reform" delegates in the August Primary of 1892, and also those "Reform" members who voted for the "Reform" delegates in the August Primary of 1892, the latter are to be allowed to vote upon their taking a pledge to abide by and support the tickets issued by the State "Reform" Convention of 1894.

This Primary election was called for the express purpose of allowing the "Reformers" of this State to select candidates from their ranks to represent them in the general primary in August; therefore only those who are known to be "Reformers" can vote at said club elections.

It is the duty of every "Reformer" in this county to turn out at the meeting of his club on the 11th of August and to see that the election is conducted fairly. Every voter has his individual preferences as to the candidates that are running for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, but remember, that they are all good men, either one of whom would make us a good Governor, and that the candidate that receives the nomination of the State "Reform" Convention is to be elected to the office of Governor.

WILLISTON HIGH SCHOOL,

FOR Boys and Girls.

WILLISTON, BARNWELL COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA. Next Session Begins Wednesday, September 12, 1894.

We wish to call your special attention to the many advantages offered by the Williston High School. Our boarding arrangements cannot be excelled by any school in the State. Our buildings are large, comfortable and well equipped. We have separate dormitories for girls and boys. One hundred boarding students can be comfortably accommodated. We employ only first class teachers. The faculty consists of five professors and two lady teachers. The teachers live in the same buildings with the students. The boys are under military regulations. Our school is Christian but non-sectarian. All students are required to attend the Church and Sunday School of their choice. The High School is divided into four classes: Freshman, Sophomore, Junior and Senior. When the course of study is completed a regular diploma is granted.
