The Treasurer's Office will be open for the collection of the taxes levied for 1904 from the 15th day of October, 1904, until the 15th day of March, 1905, inclusive.

The commutation tax will be received until February 1st, 1905.
From the 1st day of January 1905 until the 31st day of January, 1905, a penalty of 1 per cent. will be added to all unpaid taxes. From the 1st day of February, 1905, to the 28th day of February, 1905, a penalty of 2 per cent. will be added to all unpaid taxes. From the 1st day of March, 1905, until the 15th day of March, 1905, a penalty of 5 per cent. will be added to all unpaid taxes.
