THE GENERAL SESSIONS.

A true bill was found against Dorsey Doren—Assault with intent to kill. He was acquitted.

The Grand Jury submitted Presentment and was discharged Wednesday afternoon.

CASES DISPOSED OF.

Dudley Thomas pleaded guilty to second count, sentenced to two years and two months at hard labor.

A. B. Frazier pleaded guilty, sentence a fine of fifteen dollars.

A verdict of acquittal, with consent of the Solicitor, in case of E. D. Free, brought over from last term.

Elmer Gardner was sentenced to ten years at hard labor, the minimum penalty under the law.

D. A. Gillis was found guilty of manslaughter, the killing of Nelly Gulphin, but a new trial was granted.

This closed, on Friday, the work of the jury and they were discharged, and the less important cases continued to the next term.

PRESENTMENT OF THE GRAND JURY.

March Term, 1905.
To His Honor, Hon. D. A. Townsend, Presiding Judge. The Grand Jury Respectfully Report:

(1) That we have passed upon all bills submitted to us by the Solicitor.

(2) We have visited the Jail and find that suitable bedding is needed for the comfort of the prisoners held. We recommend that the County Supervisor supply the quantity and quality needed, upon requisition of the Sheriff. The Jail is in due order.

(3) We visited the Poor House, find it well kept. We recommend that a \$250.00 High, sufficiently large to accommodate the inmates be built. We further recommend that one window shaft be put in each room and that the Supervisor have all other necessary repairs made.

(4) We earnestly recommend that the County Supervisor be requested to ask the railroads to reduce the steep grades at crossings of their tracks by the public roads so that vehicles can cross them with greater ease and safety.

(5) We are pleased to report that the County Supervisor has done and is doing good economic service, by securing competitive prices for supplies for the Poor House, Chain Gang, etc.

(6) The Solicitor reports that some of the Magistrates are slow in returning warrants, recognizing, etc. to the Solicitor, thereby delaying the contents and increasing their costs. We recommend greater promptness on their parts in the future.

(7) We have examined the several offices, and find them well kept.

Thanking the officers of the court for the courtesies extended to us, we beg to express our high appreciation as citizens of Barnwell County, for the great ability, patient industry and courteous self sacrifice with which your Honor has presided over our Courts, and in bidding you Good-bye, for a time only, we hope, we wish the future shall be bright with happiness, and abundant with prosperity in all the years before you.
