Owing to the great number of criminal cases Solicitor Davis has recommended to Governor Heyward that a special term of the General Sessions be held at Aiken, commencing on the first Monday in September.

The annual barbecue and picnic at Mr. G. W. Peacock's on Friday was so lavish in abundance and so perfect in goodness that the Barnwell delegation would have been glad to have made it a protracted feast until the Monday following. On Saturday one of the chain gang guard going toward the camp at Hodge, above Snelling, came across a snake with its head open, wearing a long and wearing 15 rattles and a biton. Discharging watermelons on Monday farmer Alfred Aldrich laid down the proposition that their best excellence can be enjoyed only when they have been cooled to the right degree. His plan is to select in the afternoon the melons to be eaten next day and lay them on the ground in a good shady place where the sun can not strike them before eating time, be it morning or afternoon. Then he lays a crocus sack on each melon and, pouring a bucket of cool well water on each melon and the sack around it, leaves them alone in their glory. By next day they are cooled through and through to the temperature of the dew and fit for eating, and as long as kept in the shade that day they will be all right. He thinks a man who will put a watermelon in a refrigerator or on ice is fit for reason, straggles and spoliage, not to be trusted in a patch even at high noon.

THE PEACE PROBLEM. The Japanese and Russian plenipotentiaries at Portsmouth, N. H., have been discussing for over a week the terms of peace proposed by the former. The conditions are being considered in the order in which they were presented. The proceedings are strictly secret, but it seems that the four members, two on each side, are talking so much about doing as little as a whole Legislature. Both appear anxious for peace but the chances for non-agreement and continuance of the war appear to outweigh the peace probabilities. In Russia feeling in favor of war is said to have been unified by the largeness of the Japanese demands.

THE PRICE OF PEACE. At Portsmouth, New Hampshire, on Thursday of last week the Japanese plenipotentiaries made known to the Russian representatives the peace terms demanded by the Mikado as the cost. They are reimbursement for the expenses of the war. The cession of the Russian lease to the Liao Tung Peninsula, comprising Port Arthur and Dairen. The evacuation of the entire Province of Manchuria, the Petrozavodsk to China of any privileges Russia may have in the province, and the recognition by Russia of the principle of the "open door." The cession to Japan of the Chinese Eastern Railroad, below Harbin, the main line through Northern Manchuria to Vladivostok to remain Russian property. The recognition of the Japanese protectorate over Korea. The grant of fishing rights to Japan in the waters of the Siberian littoral northward from Vladivostok to the Behring Sea. The relinquishment to Japan of the Russian war ships interned in neutral ports. Finally, a limitation upon the naval strength of Russia in far Eastern waters.
