During the last scholastic year Clemson College spent over \$150,000. A modest part of that princely income and outgo could be spent to much better advantage by the establishment and maintenance of an experimental farm in the sandy section of the State, and Clemson cannot fill its mission properly until that is done.

President Harvie Jordan has called a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Southern Cotton Growers' Association at Asheville, N. C., on September 4th, when a minimum price will be fixed at which the farmers are to sell their cotton.

This course is necessary because the cotton buyers around the world have united to put down and to keep down the price, and they have many silent partners in their mean business.

The price will not be unreasonable. It will be based on the sure smallness of the crop and the great demand for the staple.

The cotton growers are hard to move and slow to anger, but they are in better position than ever before to demand and command fair treatment, and if the bears are too obstinate they may have to pay indemnity before the fight is over and peace restored.
