Supervisor Morris on Monday built, with the chain gang, a new 60-foot bridge over the Great Saltketchie at the Harley bridge crossing in 2 hours and 15 minutes. He will soon make a good ford below the bridge.

The building stood near the track of the Southern Railway through the cut north of the trestle. The fire broke out a few minutes after train 33 went South, and is attributed to a spark from its locomotive.

DEATHS.

Mrs. Allie Buis, widow of the late Rev. Arthur Buis, departed this life on Tuesday morning at the home of her youngest daughter, Mrs. H. E. Thompson, in Columbia. Yesterday morning her body was laid to rest in the Blackville Cemetery, beside the good, loving husband who waited her coming to the better home above.

Three daughters and four sons sorrow that she has gone away but have the perfect faith that she has safely reached the loved ones, calling on the other shore.

Mr. William Rountree, aged about 82 years, a brave soldier of the Confederacy, a good citizen at all times and under all circumstances, died on the 11th inst. at the home of his kinsman, Mr. Sullivan, near Dunbarton and was buried in the family graveyard.

On Friday, at the home of his son, Mr. James I. Green, near Dunbarton, Mr. W. W. Green, aged about 74 years, long a leading member of Joyce Branch and Cypress Chapel churches, "crossed the river," and was laid to rest in the family burial ground. He, too, was a gallant soldier of the lost cause and in peace as in war well discharged every duty to State, society, church and family and friends.
