ENTERED INTO REST.

Mrs. Ellen R. Gardner, beloved wife of Mr. B. F. Gardner, departed this life on the 2nd inst. of pneumonia and bronchitis, aged 29 years, 8 months and 15 days, leaving a devoted husband, three little daughters, an infant son of seven weeks, to miss her loved and loving presence.

The directors of the Farmers Alliance Exchange met in Columbia on Friday and appointed the fund on hand among the different counties. The original fund was \$28,495.35, the balance after losses and expenses was \$16,465.35. Barnwell's share will be \$344.32.
