Provided he be of sound senatorial quality timber, of clean, unspotted record, of solid requirement, of broad gauged judgment, of far reaching foresight and of the courage to do the right, unfrightened by public clamor, and unspooled by the flattery of sycophants.

Of late years the senior Senator of South Carolina has been one of the foremost figures in the upper house of Congress. Though comparatively a poor man so far as this world's goods count he has stood like a Saul in that "Millionaire's Club," higher than his brethren there in mind endowment, honest purpose and courage of conviction. Even those differing in opinion and policy admit and admire the strong personality of the man now so invalid from overwork. The State and the nation expect that the colleague to be chosen for him this year shall be worthy of the past and present of the Palmetto State.

It is to be hoped that they will have better luck than the sufferers of Happyville, whose pitiful story we copy today from the Arken Recorder. If we remember rightly these poor Jons were welcomed as "just the kind wanted" when they were settled on the bottomless and billis of Montmorenci and expected to draw from that arid breast of nature food for their selves and their little ones. The State that permitted it did not encourage their sacrifice should make good their losses out of the money appropriated for the immigration department.

THE COMING CAMPAIGN.

By virtue of the Constitution and Rules of the Democratic party in this State, the Democratic clubs of this county are to meet, at their respective places of meeting, Saturday, April 15th, instant, at 8 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of re-organizing.

Each club will elect a president, one or more vice-presidents, a secretary and a treasurer, also a committee on registration, an executive committee and such other committees as each club may desire, to consist of not less than three members each. Each club shall also elect delegates to the County Convention the basis of representation being one delegate for every twenty-five qualified members or a majority fraction thereof.

The County Convention will meet at Barnwell, Monday, May 4th, next, to elect delegates to the State Democratic Convention to be held in Columbia, May 20th. The County Convention is entitled to double the representation in the State Convention it has in the General Assembly.

A full attendance at the club meetings urged.

Attention of the voters of this county is called to the fact that each and every one must re-register this year or they cannot vote in the general election.

THE HAPPYVILLE COLONY.

Not Very Happy, Nor are Their Creditors.

The colony of Hungarian or Russian Jews settled upon the tract of poor land near Montmorenci several years ago, and mistaking The Happyville Colony, has come to the grief, which appeared inevitable to every one who knew the conditions.

A tract of 200 acres of as poor land, as Aiken county contains was bought for the high price of five dollars per acre, and sold at a nice advance to European Jews, who became stockholders in the so-called company. These Jews had no experience in agriculture in Europe, and of course still less understood anything about agricultural methods in South Carolina. They were put on land which is so poor that they could not really make a living off it. The result is reported to be a final collapse of the whole scheme.

We learn that the land is mortgaged to Messrs. M. M. and F. W. Crawford for \$5,000, and the Jewish Agricultural & Industrial Aid Society of New York has a second mortgage on the land, and one on 2 mules. The Bank of Aiken has a mortgage of \$500 on 3 horses; and Mr. J. T. Shuler a mortgage on sundry other stock and implements.

The colonists have been struggling for some time, but now the end of their struggle seems to have come.—Aiken Recorder.

ACCORDING TO THE INDUSTRIAL AGE

There are 30,000 unemployed persons in this State, and the cotton mills are still reducing work time.

Since the New England cotton mills began reducing wages in March the year of 1907 mill hands has been cut.

There were hot lines in Aiken county—like the battle of the ballots between the prohibition and dispensary forces.

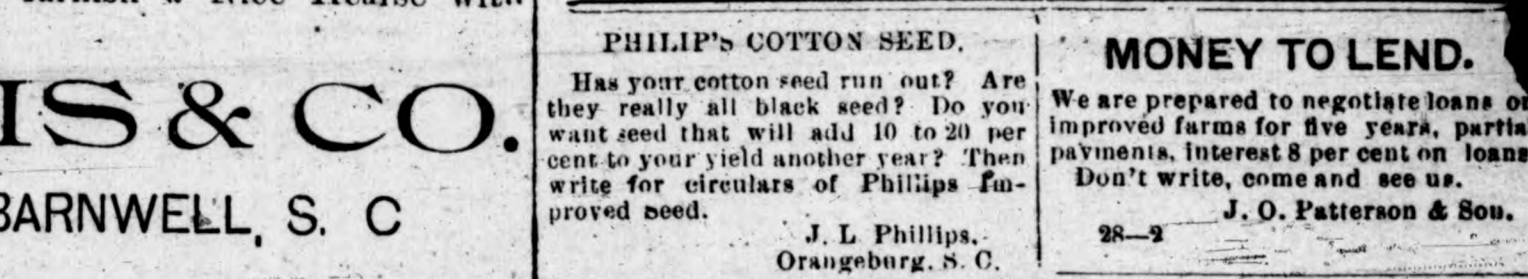
