THE PROPLE has not it the past done full justice to Farmer Alfred Aldrich There was no malice or jealousy in its failure to do so. Just simple ignorance was the cause.

We had sizned him up as a farmer ambitious to make field crops of forty bushels of corn to the acre, to be fed to mugwump game chickens, which he would exchange for their weight in silver with the heathen of New York, Ten Mile Hill, Cubs and Mexico, and to grow on the same srea enough cot ton to supply raiment to a few tribes of Filipino chicken fighters. That was the Summer view of him and his operations, but we have recently found that

he has had his Winter ambitions, and has been patiently cultivating them, without any pre-maturing horn blowing. The philosopher's stone that he has been seeking is one that many have

thought existed in imagination onlya satisfactory winter pasturage and early Spring hay production.

"His queschas as parently been a full success, and is written in green growth of his expariment allotments.

"A few years ago much was expected rom the introduction of the Vetch as a pastare and forage plantin the South. Seed bought from Europe proved uncertain, and the experimenters soon wearied and returned to the worship of their idol, king cotton.

Not so Farmer A. Procuring a small quantity of acclimated seed from the licinity of Charleston he sowed them in alternate "lands" through a pet paddock, and time has done the rest. The vetch has spread over the entire

enclosure, holding its own against bermuda grass and peach trees. And here is the vetchs way of doing. The seed lie in the soil during the summer months, coming up in the fall and furnishing succulent pasturage during the Winter, When stock is taken off in the early Spring it quickly grows high enough to be mowed. Two weeks go it had reached that stage, now it

is ready for a second mowing. In a couple of weeks it will have grown to maturity, ripened and scattered the seed, and then will die down until fall. He will make fine corn on that Vetch

tield. Vetch is a vine and for hay purposes it is best to sow it in constnership with rye or oats, as the small goain stalks will hold up and encourage the growing tines. Farmer Aldrich finda Vetch hay better than Timothy as a stock food, The Vetch is also a good soil restorer and prevents slope wash-

ing in the Winter. 
