Elliott Green, colored, was hanged in the Barowell jail on Friday. The crime for which he paid the penalty of his life was the murder of Oliver Mr W. H. Hutto of R. F. D. No. 1. Smalls, colored, in Blackville town-Barnwell paid us a call on Friday that ship in February last, Green and two other negro men were at the home of Smalls on a Saturday night gambling They had whiskey. Green lost all his money and pawned his pistol to Smalls for three dollars. Angered by the retusal of smalls to return the pistol he The State, new-paper, in Columbia struck Smalls a fatal blow on his head, of the hundreds of bargains that wait took the pistol, set fire to the bed and for the wise at the Barnwell Bee Hive. the consuming flames He was arres ted at church at E ko the next day convicted at the Summer term of court and sentenced by Judge Aldrich to be hanged September 18th A respite to October 16 h was granted by Governor Ansel upon petition of citizens asking communication of the death sentence to ife imprisonment. The Governor af ter inquiry refused to grant the com mutation. Green went to the gallow without a trace of fear. He admitted that he alone had killed Smalls, and professed that he had obtained Divine orgiveness and claimed that he pre ferred death while prepared for it to li e imprisonment. He sang and prayed with a clear unwavering voice, and poke gratefully of the humane treatment he had received from Sheriff reech. The first religious service was conducted by Rev. W. S. Jones, colored, his spiritual adviser.

Green's neck was broken by the fall if eight feet. After eight minutes he was pronounced dead by Dr. E L. Patterson. At the ead of twelve min ntes his body was cut down. put in cothe and given to his uncle for burial. He was said to be 18 years old.
