PRESENTMENT OF GRAND JURY.

To His Honor: Hon. John S. Wilson, Presiding Judge, the Grand Jury respectfully reports:

1-That we have passed on all bills submitted to us by the Solicitor.

2-We recommend that each Magistrate in Barnwell County be required to file at the end of each month a statement of all warrants, costs and collections in criminal cases with the proper officers.

3-We recommend that the Solicitor obtain order to require Mr. T. S. Dunbar, Magistrate, to show cause at next term of this Court, why he failed to file with the Clerk of Court papers of State vs. dead body of John Harris.

4-It has been referred to our attention that Sam Myers and Rebecca Williams have been living in adultery and after an investigation of the same we have thought it proper that they be prosecuted and this we have done.

5-In a former presentment of our body we recommended that a committee of the Grand Jury together with an expert, make a careful and rigid examination of the books of the county officers.

6-We have examined the poor yard and find it in good condition, with one or two exceptions not of sufficient moment to present. Inasmuch as a part of the lands of the Poor House Farm are not cultivated, we recommend that they be utilized by directing the Coroner to plant them in vegetables for the unfortunate inmates of the Poor House.

7-We have examined the Jail and found it in fairly good shape and that our former recommendations have been carried out.

8-Inasmuch as the present county jail is unsafe by reason of its age and is closely by reason of its being a framed building and not commodious enough to handle the prisoners with any degree of comfort and so far away from the Court House as to cause to the county great expenditure of time in bringing in and conveying from the Court House the prisoners we recommend that a suitable site in rear of Court House be purchased and that a new jail be erected thereon, and for the necessary funds for this work our delegation in the Legislature do pass a bill providing for a one mill levy for the year 1909 and for one mill levy in the year 1910 which will aggregate a sum amounting to \$10,000.00 with which sum a brick building can be erected that will make safe all prisoners committed therein and be in keeping with the wishes of our people and the dignity of our country.

9-We further recommend that after the levy of 1910 has been made that the old jail be sold in such a way as will realize most money.

10-Thanking the officers of the Court for the courtesies extended to us we beg to express our high appreciation as citizens of Barnwell county for the great ability, patient industry and courteous self sacrifice with which your Honor has presided in our county and in bidding you good bye we express the wish and the hope that the future shall be brighter with happiness and abundant with prosperity in all the years before you.

A MYSTERIOUS MURDER.

On Monday morning the body of Mr. W. Perry Ussery was laid to rest in Long Branch Church Cemetery. The touching funeral services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. John K. Goode. Fully five hundred people were gathered there to join in paying the final tribute of human regard and affection to one whose white life had been passed in that community and who was loved and honored by all the multitude of friends that knew his uprightness of life and character. There was a strong and tender heart's sorrow too great for words, that a life so full of happy usefulness should have been so cruelly ended before its sun had reached its high noon.

On Saturday evening about half past ten o'clock he was standing in conversation with Mr. Martin N. Holland on the edge of the carnival grounds in rear of the Opera House when from the sheltering darkness an assassin with two true aim shot him to instant death.
