## EXPENSELESS COURTS.

According to the annual reports of Solicitor-General of the Fourth Judicial Circuit, composed of the counties of Darlington, Marlboro and Chesfield all the expenses of the Court of General Sessions for last year were paid out of the costs collected. During the year 78 cases were tried in the circuit, only three acquittals by the jury, 71 acquittals by consent verdicts and 71 verdicts of guilty.

## THE PASSING PATRIOTS.

The Confederate pensioners grow in need and enrollment as they become greater in years and less able to fight the battle for food and shelter. According to the annual report of Comptroller General Jones there are now 9,537 pensioners on the rolls. During last year the sum of \$2,725.95 was refunded because the old soldiers received their last discharges and crossed the river before they received this pay.

## THE LAZY BUG.

That the hook worm is no respecter of persons was recently proved by the examination of a class of one hundred students at Tulane University, the great New Orleans school. Forty of them were found to be infected, some of the young men apparently enjoying robust health.

## THE CENSUS.

Supervisor George Waterhouse of Beaufort is ready to send out blanks to persons who would like to get places and pay for taking the census returns in their townships next Spring.

The questions are easy, and the work will pay \$2 and up a day. If any of our unemployed young men would like such work they should write at once to Mr. George Waterhouse at Beaufort for blanks. These blanks must be filled out by the applicants and sent to Mr. Wat house in sure time to reach him by January 31st, when the time limit expires.

## TREASURERS NOTICE.

The Treasurer's Office will be open for the collection of taxes levied for the fiscal year commencing January 1st 1909, from the 15th day of October 1909 to the 15th day of March 1910 inclusive.

From the 1st to the 31st of January 1910 inclusive a penalty of one per cent will be added; from the 1st to the 28th of February 1910 inclusive a penalty of two per cent will be added to all taxes paid in February.
