Georgia Divorces too easy.

Judge W. D. Ellis of the Superior Court, Atlanta, thinks divorces too easily obtained in Georgia. His court has six terms a year in two and a half days last week 172 unopposed divorces were granted out of 144 persons divorced free and loose in court and many more. Judge Ellis wants the law so changed that in unopposed cases the facts alleged must be proved, and that there can be no judgment of separation by default.
