Black Brute Criminally Assaults a White Lady in Columbia.

THE FIEND WAS CAUGHT

And Was Taken to the Penitentiary After Being Identified by His Victim. Who is Seriously III From the Terrible Ordeal Through Which She Passed.

The lady was in a precarious condition Tuesday night, but Wednesday morning her condition was reported to be somewhat improved. No one but her husband and an intimate friend are allowed to be at her side. by the advice of the attending physician. She is completely prostrated.
