Gas Explosion in a Virginia Coal Mine Entombs Many Workmen.

TWELVE WERE KILLED

Greeno Mine, on Norfolk and Western Railway, Scene of Horrible Disaster - Report of Explos Heard Miles Around-Rescue Party Enters Shaft and Bodies Recov-

As soon as the news of the explosion had spread to other nearby mining operations, of which there are a number in the vicinity; rescue parties were formed and conveyed to the scene by special trains and private conveyances, but nothing could be done, except bring out the dead bodies. Only slight damage was done to the mine.

The Greeno mine employes about 55 men.

The wives and children and other relatives of the missing men were attracted to the scene of death by he loud report of the explosion. and, weeping and praying they have kept up ceaseless begging for help to save their loved ones.

When Superintendent Barrowman and his party entered the mine an hour after the explosion they gained some distance within the main opening before they signalley ".e engineer to stop. Those out... waited for further signals, but none came. Hours passed, and not a sign came of the superintendent and his comanions, and it was concluded that hey had been caught suddenly in a storm of heated air and suffocated.

By 2 o'clock in the afternoon four unidentified bodies had been taken out. They were recovered by miners who entered the shaft with helmets that furnished fresh air.

Later in the day T. E. Boan, of he Clinchfield Coal Corporation, assumed direction of the rescue work. He has only a limited number of helmets, and is making every possible use of them.

Near dark six more bodies were recovered, along with one man who! s yet alive, but whose condition is recarious. He is fearfully burned and bruised, and is unconscious. When the explosion occurred the whistle at the mine was sounded ontinuously, giving alarm all over the surrounding country. It was heard in the small villages several miles away and immediately there was a rush of people to the scene. A young lady in charge of the telephone office at Coeburn, three miles away from them the mine, heard the news and sent out a call for help.
