## HON. JEFFERSON DAVIS

Monument Unveiled With Impressive

tents and relief funds. Monastir is a town of European Turkey, capital of the vilayet of Monastir in Macedonia, eighty-five miles northwest of Salonki. It is an important military center and has a large trade in wheat and tobacco beides having manufactories of gold

and silverware and carpets. The population, which is estimated at 45,000, is a medley of all the nationalities to be found in Macedonia, the Christians numbering about half of the total.

## PROTEST AGAINST IT

President Taft is Urged to Withdraw

Treaty, United States Senate Asked to Refuse Assent and the California Delegation Instructed to

Oppose Rutification. The text of a new treaty with Japan, designed to replace that of 1894 and drawn with the special design of liminating the restrictions upon tmigration contained in that treaty has been laid before the Senate by

President Taft. The essential difference between the proposed treaty and the existing convention is said to be in the fact that it omits all reference to such restrictions and leaves to the national honor of Japan the enforcement at her own ports of the limitations upon emigration from Japan now expressly placed upon immigration into
