GOOD OUT OF EVIL.

It costs a mint of money to maintain an army and navy of the size and expensiveness of those wearing the uniforms of the United States. And the existence of such a force shows that our country must have very bad designs against other powers, or that our neighbors, far or near, must be very barbarous people in forcing us to keep constantly ready to protect ourselves with shot, shell and sword.

But there is "good in everything..." In the so-called war for humanity that gave Cuba a freedom which it does not understand or appreciate and put into the keeping of the United States that "bag of cats," as Senator Tillman defines the Philippines, it was discovered and demonstrated beyond the smallest doubt that yellow fever spreads and is communicated solely through the bite of a species of mosquito. Unless one is bitten by a blood sucker of that poisonous breed he cannot contract yellow fever, no matter how he exposes himself. This revelation deprives Yellow Jack of all his terrors in warm climates.

Another discovery of greater value is the finding out within the recent past that vaccination with typhoid serum is a sure preventive of that death scourge of the temperate zones. Three years ago Brig. Gen. Torrey, Surgeon General of the United States, began the vaccination of troops with the typhoid serum. The result has been an unbroken saving in life and prevention of suffering.

There are now, and have been for several months, 18,000 soldiers in camp in Texas. All these were vaccinated and only one case of typhoid has developed and that was of a mild type.

For generations the efficiency of armies in the fields and garrisons in the forts has been greatly weakened by typhoid and typhus fevers. This vaccination discovery promises not only a larger life saving among the sons of battle, but in the homes of peace and marts of trade it will save much suffering and loss of life.

Typhoid is more a disease of a clay country, of the mountain valleys and crowded towns and cities than of the more porous and soils nearer the sea. There the vaccination treatment will be of far more general benefit in such localities as have annual recurrences of typhoid, sometimes approaching epidemic proportions.

The late Dr. George R. C. Todd said that he had known only one typhoid case in Barnwell, and it was his opinion that the germs producing it were brought from Philadelphia in a suit of clothes transported by express.

W. J. Bryan's long Sunday talk in Columbia on politics would indicate that the great Nebraskan has left his Presbyterian behavior at home.

At this distance and knowing nothing of the probability except through exchanges we venture to say that if Congressman Loyer is again in the race Editor Hoyt may run. But if Mr. Loyer sets his heart on the Senatorial bee Editor Hoyt will not run. He'll just aviate as a winner.

FALL IRISH POTATOES.

For eating the second crop is much better than that made in the Spring. It is difficult, however, to get a stand, but the result may repay the trouble of a trial. This is the best way we know: Where the Spring crop vines are dead, the tubers are ripe. Dig enough now to get small seed for planting. Put the small potatoes in a shady place, under a shelter or house, to dry out. Don't let the sun shine on them. After they have dried a week or ten days lay them on the ground in a shady place, not touching, and cover with a couple of inches of earth. Wet this earth blanket covering and keep it moist until toward the end of July. Then plant the potatoes, many of which may have commenced to sprout, in a damp place. They will not make much vines, but the potatoes will be first class in taste and quality.

Don't count on certain success. Just plant a small trial patch this year.

THEIR SILVER WEDDING.

The 25th anniversary of the marriage of President and Mrs. William H. Taft was celebrated in the White House at Washington on Monday evening with almost royal magnificence.
