ABOUT POTATOES.
Farmer S. said to me the other day: "One year I made 100 bushels of fine sweet potatoes in my larger patch. The crop was dug early and carefully put up in two large barrels. After awhile I found they were not keeping well, so I had the two barrels empty. From them I sorted out 27 bushels of sound potatoes which I sold in Barnwell."

KEEP UP CATTLE.
Several hundred dollars worth of good cattle have recently died of Texas fever in this county. As a rule every where nine out of ten animals having it die. The disease is caused by ticks almost too small to be seen by the naked eye that burrow in the flesh and carry the fever germ into the blood. The disease is communicated easily from one animal to another. The mother ticks lay its eggs in the ground where nature hatches them. The young ticks climb up grass and weeds and from them get on the grazing cattle. If cattle are kept off a field or pasture a year the ticks will starve.

A mixture of equal parts of cotton seed and kerosene oil with sulphur added, rubbed on the animals will kill the ticks, but they will come again. The books say that cold weather will kill the ticks. When attacked with the Texas fever the cattle stand still until they die, which will be in about four days. The best and fastest die first.

WILLIAM GILMORE SIMMS.
Died October 15th, 1912.

There is today in every home in the old Barnwell district, from the clear, placid Edisto to the heavy Savannah, an abiding grief too hard to be softened by women's tears, a continuing grief too great to be told by the voices of men.

As if some great light had suddenly failed before the morning had dawned, as if some majestic ship with all its wealth of human hopes and happiness had vanished like a falling snowflake beneath the unremitting waters of the mid ocean, came the tidings that the true, brave, gentle heart had ceased to beat the march of life, that the luminous brain had ended its long and loving and safe guiding service to all humanity, that the generous hands were nerveless and the kindly eyes closed in earth's last sleep. A soldier of the Confederacy in his boyhood days, the blood that he shed on the bosom of the Old Dominion sanctified all of his future hope and love and ambition and unselfish labor to the public good.

In all the perils of the years of his manhood whenever the prostrate mother or stricken father lay on their beds of pain, it was William Gilmore Simms who was always the first to stand between her civilization and danger and from any post of duty he never retreated.

And Barnwell people in every school district have loved and honored and trusted and believed in him as one true to his sacred mission among them. He has gone from us in the golden afternoon of a splendid career when it seemed that the heats of the mid-day had passed and the coming of life's sunset appeared as far away as a forgotten dream, yet his memory, white in its purity, beautiful in symmetry of virtues and fragrant in its freedom from wrong thought or ill deed shall be treasured in the hearts that knew his worth and that were bettered by his friendship.

Carolina has had in all her centuries of great history no nobler son than William Gilmore Simms. He rests in peace, every life duty well done, for he will be here in all his days the grand old name of gentleman, and kept the faith of his fathers as a Christian in deed and truth.
