

## THUGS TAKE WOMAN

### FORCE HER INTO AUTO. DRIVE AWAY AND KILL HER

## FINE MEN WERE IN GANG

### The Woman Was Taken to the Suburbs of the City and Was Shot to Death by One of the Men, While the Other Four Stood by and Looked on.

A special despatch from Bridgeport, Conn., says five men engaged an automobile at the railroad station there Thursday night and told Geo. Hull to drive them to No. 105 South Avenue.

Arriving at this address one of the men entered the house and told Rose White, twenty-two, she was wanted by a man in the car who had come from Chicago to see her. According to the story told by Hull later the woman approached the car in fear and once offered to retreat, but the men called to her in a threatening voice and ordered her to approach.

As she got alongside the car the man who said he was from Chicago spoke more kindly to her. He told her that she must get into the machine and go with him and his companions. Again the woman hesitated, but she was seized and forced into the machine.

Hull then was ordered to drive toward Peck's Mills, near Stratford, a suburb of Bridgeport. He obeyed and was nearing the Mills when word came from one of the fares to stop.

As soon as the car stopped the five men alighted. Hull later told the police that the man from Chicago seemed to do all the talking. He had some grievance and was threatening a woman while his companions stood about. She appealed to them to help her and they laughed at her.

One of the men turned to Hull and told him to drive on. The chauffeur hesitated and was told he would be hurt unless he obeyed. At the same time the man from Chicago, so Hull says, seized the woman by the throat, drew her close to him and, placing a revolver against her forehead, fired. As she fell he fired again. This time the bullet went through her throat and then the man and his companions hurried in a motor car to the hills. There they found the woman's body.

The woods were surrounded and three men hiding bushes were captured after a hard fight. They were all killed and a fourth man was captured after a struggle. They had not been found. ### MEXICAN TROOPS CAPTURED THE CITY WITH EASE

## REBELS TRY TO ESCAPE

### General Diaz, Who Commanded the Rebels, Was Made Prisoner When Three Hundred of His Men Refused to Fire on the Loyal Troops of the Government.

The revolt of Gen. Felix Diaz, nephew of the exiled President of Mexico, has been short lived. The town of Vera Cruz, which he occupied with about 2,000 adherents for several days, was captured by the Mexican Federal forces Wednesday. The casualties were few. No foreigners were hurt. Two Federal columns, commanded by Col. Jimenez Castaneda and Gen. Joaquin Betram, entered Vera Cruz from the north and south.

There was slight opposition to their advance. Col. Castro with less than fifty men, captured Gen. Felix Diaz, whose 200 men are being held in quarters. The revolutionists in the barracks have not yet surrendered. They say they will hold out until the last man is killed. However, the weaker spirits seem to be trying to escape. ### A MAN SHOTS HIS WIFE'S NEGRO CHAUFFEUR.

A special despatch to the New York World from Philadelphia says Samuel B. Stuart, husband of a woman regarded as very rich, and Thomas C. Foxy, the negro chauffeur of the family, are in the Jewish Hospital, both with bullet wounds in their legs. Mrs. Stuart is out under \$1,000 bail as a material witness to the double shooting, and Laura Dorsey, one of the maids of the Stuart household, is on bail as a witness.

The shooting occurred early in the evening in the Stuart home, on Oak Lane Terrace, Mt. Rose Park. Stuart also married his beautiful wife some time ago, got home earlier than usual and wanted to know of the maid to whom Mrs. Stuart and Foxy, the chauffeur, were. The answer was that they were out in the machine.

According to the maid's affidavit, Stuart looked her up in a corner and wanted to know all she may have heard about Mrs. Stuart and the chauffeur. She answered that she had been to work and not to discuss the matter. Just then Foxy drove Mrs. Stuart to the front of the mansion. Mrs. Stuart tripped upstairs and Stuart followed her and got his revolver.

He came down again and faced Foxy, just in time to hear his wife called to by the negro as "Mother." He was so provoked that he drew the revolver and fired at the negro and the negro was killed through the calves of the legs. He grabbed the maids and the wife and ran out of the house with a woman.

The shot had been heard by the neighbors and the police were called. They found the revolver on the floor and the body of the negro. The wife of Stuart was also brought into the hospital.

## FROM BURNING SHIP

### DAYS AND NIGHTS IN DANGER WITHOUT SLEEP

## EVERYBODY WAS SAVED

### The Terrible Experience of Passengers and Crew on a Steamship From Savannah to New York That Caught Fire While Out on the High Sea.

A Norfolk dispatch says just when the life savers and her crew thought they had the flames under control the fire which had been raging in the forward hold of the Norfolk and Western steamer Berkshire broke out anew late Monday and there was a panic among the passengers and crew of the burning vessel.

To add to the terror of those on board there was an explosion in the hold where the fire was confined and the big ship was shaken from stem to stern by the concussion. The steamer appeared to list slightly after the explosion, but no one ventured near the forward part of the ship to ascertain the nature or what was the cause.

The revenue cutter Seminole, which reached the burning life boat Sunday night, was within 100 yards of the Berkshire when the explosion occurred, and she signaled the ship to board the big ship that she would send lifeboats and take off the passengers, crew and life savers.

The transfer of those on the Berkshire to the Seminole is said to have been thrilling. A northeast gale has been blowing the coast since Sunday morning and Monday a fine cold rain added gloom to the already nervous position of the disheartened passengers.

When told that they had better take to the boats the passengers many of whom wanted to leave the ship, Sunday night, expressed disapproval at the plan, but when the rain and the blowing of a gale drove them and the rain beating in sheets, they were lowered into the lifeboats of both the Seminole and the Berkshire. The motor boat of the life savers was also brought into the lifeboats.

The life savers and crew from the Berkshire, almost completely exhausted by their long night's watch, were about to leave the ship when they were taken off by the revenue cutter Seminole. The passengers came first, then the crew and the life savers. The members of the crew of the Berkshire, with lastly buried heads and weary eyes, were taken off by the revenue cutter Seminole.

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## SEIGLER TO BE HANGED

### SOUTH CAROLINA MAN GETS IN SERIOUS TROUBLE.

### Convicted of the Murder of Henry A. Stanford in an Oklahoma Court Some Time Ago.

Henry A. Seigler, a former resident of McCormick in this State, was convicted some time ago of the murder of Wm. A. Stanford, rival claim owner in the Wichitas, and with punishment fixed at death by the jury in the case, was Friday sentenced by Judge J. T. Johnson of the district court to be hanged by the neck until dead, date of execution being fixed for November 23, between sunrise and sunset. Pronouncement of sentence renewed the overruling of the motion for a new trial, hearing on same having been had two weeks ago.

An Oklahoma paper in speaking of the case, says the defendant, his wife and children, attorneys for the defense and State, as well as a number of spectators were present when sentence was pronounced and the scene was in a sense dramatic. The wife of the convicted man collapsed when sentence was pronounced, weeping bitterly.

When asked by the court as to whether he had anything to say as to why sentence of death should not be passed upon him, Seigler arose and spoke for some minutes. He stated a firm voice that he did not feel he was guilty, and that he did not feel he had had a fair trial. Not only that, but Seigler stated that he felt the court knew it.

He demanded the state's case as a name up between county attorneys, Mr. A. L. Rich and a number of others who did not care what they swore to on a witness stand. He declared that the proceeding had been an injustice and that he felt he had had a fair trial.

In a representative of the press said that while he was not a religious man, if he were going to pray to God, he would pray for Seigler. He also said that he had a hunch that Seigler was innocent and that he would like to see him acquitted.

## BIG VICTORY WON

### BULGARIANS DEFEAT AND CAPTURE A BIG ARMY.

## CAPTURE A STRONGHOLD

### After a Battle Lasting Three Days the Bulgarians Capture Kirk-Killess and the Turkish Army of Fifty Thousand That Defended the Place and Much Stores.

A cablegram from London says a three day's battle and a Bulgarian turning movement has resulted, according to Sofia accounts, in the fall of Kirk-Killess, and the capture of the Turkish garrison, numbering 50,000 men and large quantity of military stores.

The capture of this stronghold in which the Turks attached almost the same importance as to Adrianople, was commenced from Constantiople by an official communication explaining that the Serbian army at Kirk-Killess in attempting to split the Turkish forces discovered that they were in greater strength than had been anticipated. The Turks, therefore, retired to the south to await reinforcements.

The news of the Bulgarian victory has caused great rejoicing in Sofia, where it is expected the fall of Adrianople will soon follow. It is generally assumed that Abulhaziz Pasha is still engaged in bringing up his main army to Adrianople. An interesting situation will develop should the Turks be compelled to evacuate Adrianople.

It is supposed that the next stand of the Turks will be made at Debarra, twenty-seven miles south of Adrianople, an important strategic position on the road to Constantinople. In other directions both the Serbians and the Turks claim great victories at Kumanova, the Serbians declaring they have captured the town and the Turks claiming they have recaptured the town.

Advices from Sofia say that Kirk-Killess fell at eleven o'clock in the morning, according to latest reports received from Bulgarian sources, which all now there originates. The Turkish troops retired in disorder to the direction of Manar Hisar, 41 miles to the east of Kirk-Killess, a battery of field guns, a few machine guns, many tents and large quantities of ammunition and food.

When the news was received in Romania the flag of the Serb States formed procession to the Greek, Serbian and Rumanian Legations, in which a national anthem were given. The national anthem were given. The national anthem were given.

The Bulgarians apparently left a small force in front of Adrianople and attempted to work to the rear to cut the communications with Constantinople. An advance Turkish column, commanded by Mahmud Hassan Pasha, son of the Grand Vizier, attempted a surprise attack, but the enemy was infinitely superior in strength the attack was not pushed home, and the Turkish troops retreated in good order to position further south.

It is not clear where the Bulgarian attack will be delivered, but the next two days should witness a decisive battle. There is much slaughter at what is described as a splendid victory over the Serbians at Kumanova. Officials of the army office went so far as to express the feeling that the Serbians need no longer be reckoned with.

In an engagement Tuesday at Marsh, at the junction of the Mirna and Anja rivers, close to Adrianople, the Bulgarians were attacked by 5,000 Turks. After an hour of heavy artillery and rifle fire the Turks were defeated and fled in disorder, leaving the field strewn with dead and many wounded. The Bulgarians captured 200 prisoners, a dozen quick rifles and quantities of munitions. Many Turks drowned themselves in the river because they believed the Bulgarians massacred their prisoners.

Official announcement was made at Sofia that the Serbian forces have occupied Novipazar, Prishtina, Kumanova, Kratovo and Kotschan. Detachments of the Serbian army entered Kumanova, after annihilating the Turkish batteries. The fighting around that town lasted three days. Late reports advised that heavy fighting is still proceeding in that district. The Greeks are operating from Arta toward Janina and the neighborhood of Gortinova.
