**About Picking Cotton.**

Cotton should be picked as fast as it is well opened. To fail to do so, is to invite lower grades and lower yield and a smaller price. When possible, the seed cotton should be stored long enough before ginning to allow it to cure out so as to gin the seed cleaner and to prevent the cutting of the lint by the gin saws. The ginning of green cotton causes considerable loss to the cotton farmers of the South. There is a theory that seed cotton allowed to lie in bulk for three or more months will yield considerable more lint than if ginned soon after picking. I do not know as to the accuracy of this statement. It might be well for some of our experiment stations to make tests, and determine if there is any real advantage in it.—T. B. Parker, in The Progressive Farmer.

Pender, eighty-two years of age, and a native of Barnwell, S. C., died at a local hospital last night after an illness of several months. The remains were prepared for interment at the funeral parlors of Messrs. Henderson Bros. and will be shipped at noon tomorrow over the Atlantic Coast Line to Allendale, S. C., for interment. Mr. Pender is survived by his wife, Mrs. Fanny Pender of Scotia, S. C., and three sons, Messrs. T. T. and J. W. Pender of Allendale and G. H. Pender of Garnett, S. C. He was a prosperous farmer of the Allendale section and was widely known. During the four years of the Civil War he rendered the Southern cause valuable service in the field, having served throughout the strife.
