ernor-May Be Nominated on First Ballot.

A telephone message from Charleston shortly after 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon stated that the majority against Blease would be between 15,000 and 20,-000 votes, Blease and McLeod running the second race. There were about 20,000 votes still to be heard from, but no material change was anticipated.

In Charleston County, with only a few boxes unreported, the vote was: Blease, 4,968; Cantey, 54; Coleman, 122; Duncan, 59; Laney, 426; McLeod, 4,041.

With about 137,000 votes in the State heard from at two o'clock last night Blease was leading McLeod by over 6.000 votes, as follows: Blease 60,166; McLeod, 53, 816; Laney, 17,527; Coleman, 2,887; Dun-an, 1,632 and Cantey 1,147. There are about 60,000 votes yet to be accounted for. A second race between Mc-Lood and Blease is assured. The other candidates for State offices ran as follows:

DUTCH PROPHET" TALKS.

The Dutch Weather Prophet here. by responds to numerous requests, both oral and written, for a forecast. The majority of the inquiries concern the matter of rain. The Dutch Weather Prophet saw the rainy season extend ten days beyond the usual limit, closing August 20. The thunderstorms of August 17 and August 20 indicated the end of the wet season which began in January and has caused the most phenomenal rainfall in 80 years or more. The appearance of cirrus and stratus clouds on Tuesday, the 22nd, confirmed previous indications that hay making weather had arrived. So a week has intervened without rain and these conditions will continue with the probability of seasonable showers.

Hot weather like last year will not prevail throughout September, and temperatures are more probably to be even lower than has been enjoyed in August, with a very cool period with September 14 as the central date.

The date of the earlist frost is centered around October 14. The winter will be colder than 1921-22. One snow of extensive proportions is also one of the in-
