## MCLEOD WINS IN LANDSLIDE— DEFEATS BLEASE OVER 15,000

### LEE COUNTY CITIZEN WINS GOVERNORSHIP

Hope Defeats Swearingen, Incumbent, by an Overwhelming Majority.

### UNION COUNTY MAN WINS HANDS DOWN

McLeod in Statement Says That He Will Be "Governor of All the People."

Thos. G. McLeod, of Bishopville, was nominated for Governor in the South Carolina Democratic primary held Tuesday, defeating Cole. L. Blease, of Columbia and Newberry, by a majority which will probably not be under 15,000.

The vote developed what was virtually a landslide for McLeod, and he swept the entire State, carrying all but a handful of counties. More than one county which gave Mr. Blease a majority in the first primary reversed itself Tuesday and gave a majority to Mr. McLeod.

The vote Tuesday was at least 10,000 greater than that cast in the first primary. Mr. Blease, who received 77,798 votes in the first primary, increased his vote Tuesday by less than 10,000. Mr. McLeod, who received 65,768 votes in the first primary, increased his vote Tuesday by well over 30,000.

#### Vote for Governor.

At an early hour Wednesday morning the vote stood: McLeod, 98,431; Blease, 83,059; McLeod's majority, 15,372.

J. H. Hope, of Union, defeated J. E. Swearingen, incumbent, for the office of State Superintendent of Education. In a total of 178,071 votes, Hope received 104,543 and Swearingen 73,528, Hope's lead being 31,015.

In the Governor's race probably not over five or six thousand votes are unreported. The votes still to be heard from cannot change the result.

### BARNWELL COUNTY GIVES McLEOD LARGE MAJORITY

Weissinger Defeats Blatt for House of Representatives by 349 Majority.

### RILEY RE-ELECTED COUNTY AUDITOR

Still Re-elected Supervisor by Majority of Votes in Hotly Contested Race

With every box reported, Thos. G. McLeod got a majority of 520 votes in Barnwell County over Cole. L. Blease, third term candidate for Governor, in Tuesday's primary election, the vote being: Blease, 903; McLeod, 1,423. In the first primary Blease received 914 votes, McLeod and Cantey, Coleman, Duncan and Laney to 273, a combined vote against Blease of 1,423 will be seen, therefore, that while Blease polled less than he did in the first primary, McLeod retained his full strength and in addition polled of the votes cast for the other candidates with to spare.

Swearingen carried the county by a majority of over two to one over Hope in the race for Superintendent of Education.

#### County Offices.

In the second race between Solomon Blatt, of Barnwell, and G. L. Weissinger, of Blackville, the latter was elected by a majority of 349 votes, the total being: Blatt, 987; Weissinger, 1,336.

R. W. Riley was re-elected Auditor over C. W. Moody by a majority of 499 votes, the count being: Moody, 914; Riley, 1,411.

The race for Supervisor proved closer than either of the other two contests, Jut S. Still being re-elected over E. G. Birt by a majority of 199 votes, their totals being: Birt, 1,059; Still, 1,258.

#### BARNWELL COUNTY GETS \$5,757 LICENSE MONEY

Sale of Motor Vehicles Licenses in the State Totals \$574,719.10.

Accruals to the counties so far this year through the sale of motor vehicle licenses by the State highway department have reached a total of \$574,719.10, according to figures compiled Friday by the department. This total includes the sales for August. Counties in this section have already received or will receive the following sums from this total.
