"It is very gratifying to everybody to see the great progress being made in the destruction of cotton stalks. On trips throughout the county last week we found on every side men destroping outton stalks. We feel that during the present work more stalks will be destroyed than ever beface in the history of the county for the time of year. I want to coution every farmer that it is necessary to kill all cotton stalks at once if we are to get the most good from the work.

"Farmers should remember that killing stalks, gathering corn and peas and the planting of grain are the covential things to do at this time. "Let's not forget that it is importand to get our outs in as early as possible now, and there should be no letup until these important things have been done.
