WHY LEGION POSTS PROGRESS

Working Hand in Hand With Respective Communities Results in Membership Increase.

Progress of the posts of the American Legion is founded on the relations with the community in which they are located, according to findings of the national officers of the organization from a survey of posts showing regular membership increase.

This survey was made in 22 states, principally those of agricultural regions, and represented reports from 640 posts in towns with an average population of 11,193 persons. Each of these posts has shown membership increase over that of the preceding year. Membership growth of these posts has not been sporadic. It has been steady and sure. Of the 300 posts formed in 1919, an average of 36 members was shown. In 1920 this average for 357 posts had dropped to 28. The next year 304 posts added one more to the average. In 1922, the average for 600 posts jumped to 58 and thus far the 640 posts show an average of 62 members.

Reasons assigned for this growth are primarily due to interest in civic affairs. A majority of post officers say that membership has grown because "they have sold the Legion to the community." Such posts have encountered little opposition in their five-year progress in Legion activity.

Actual accomplishments of the Legion show a multiplicity of movements and a keen observance by the veterans of the needs of the communities. The questionnaires show that posts have built tourist parks and camping grounds; they have caused city parks to be opened; some build and maintain baseball parks and clubs; others build community building; many have erected public monuments; a few provide fire hand concerts by Legion musical organizations; some plant trees as a part of a conservation program and for memorial purposes; others maintain burial plots for deceased ex-service men; most Legion posts make efforts to obtain employment for former service men; they assist by word and deed and sponsor boys; they participate in Americanization of aliens, and offer instruction in citizenship for boys and girls; and the majority perform service work for disabled men, through the posts and in the hospitals, either as visitors or as the regular staff of Legion hospitals. Other activities include the legislative accomplishments for the veterans, service work for the disabled in suspension, participation in bond drives, parades, athletic, and other movements developing community interest.

LEGION HAS GREAT GROWTH

Posts of Veterans' Organization in Seventeen Foreign Countries; New York Grade in U. S.

The sun never sets upon the American Legion. Veterans of the World War, scattered to the four corners of the world, have joined other comrades in forming posts of the veterans' association. The annual report of the Legion's national treasurer shows that the Legion has chartered posts in seventeen foreign countries and in five territorial possessions of the United States, in addition to the 48 states and District of Columbia.

The Mexico department leads all foreign countries in membership. Posts have been established in the following nations: Argentine, Brazil, British Isles, Canada, Chile, China, Cuba, France, Germany, Guatemala, India, Japan, Korea, Mexico, New Zealand, Poland and Turkey as well as in the territorial possessions of Alaska, Canal Zone, Hawaii, Philippine Islands and Porto Rico.

New York is the largest home department of the Legion. Its 57,417 members gives that state a representation of 43 delegates to the national convention, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Iowa and Ohio following in relative order.

SANITARIUM TO BE ENLARGED

Legion Auxiliary of South Dakota is Breaking Ground for Soldiers' Wing to Institution.

In the heart of the Black Hills, where the air is stimulating and pure, the American Legion auxiliary of South Dakota is breaking ground for the erection of a soldiers' wing to the sanitarium for tuberculosis at Sanator.

Here the men who contracted the dreaded white plague in the service will have an opportunity to fight their way back to health with the advanced stages of the best climate and modern facilities in the world.

The addition will cost \$10,000. The sanitarium is being built in a natural part of the park country, surrounded by forests of Black Hills yellow pine. The auxiliary expects to complete the structure soon, giving not only more beds but also all conveniences in the ward.

KASS GOT 85 NEW MEMBERS

Detroit Legion Worker Won Trip to National Convention for His Rapid-Fire Hustling.

John Kass, a member of the Charles A. Learned post of the American Legion in Detroit, made the Legion national hall of fame recently when he enrolled 85 new members for his post. As a prize for winning the contest he received a trip to the Legion national convention in San Francisco with all transportation expenses paid by the post.

The most formidable rival Kass developed in the contest which lasted about two and one-half months was "Pete" Kolbe who obtained 65 members. Both of the contestants worked hard during the last four days of the race. Kolbe obtained 18 new members, but this record was beaten by Kass who speeded up the home stretch and recruited 36 Legionnaires, or nine a day during that period.

"getters" obtained some valuable information during the contest. One of the surprising bits of information was that the reason why many veterans have not joined the Legion is because they have never been asked to enter the organization. Legion officials are this fact as a demonstration of the necessity for a more active campaign of former service men.

Both Kass and Kolbe signed up scores of veterans for the Legion in previous membership contests.

MAY ADMIT FORMER ENEMIES

Osway Favors Permitting Germans, Austrians and Russians to Enter Veterans' Federation.

Albin Osway, national commander of the American Legion, revealed a sensation in veterans circles when he asked allied veterans to discuss peace and hatred from their hearts and pen in a letter to the American Legion and Russian World War fighters into the International Veterans' Federation.

"Simply there must be some way in which we can speak to the men we fought and make them realize there is a better way of living among nations than continuing hating one another," Commander Osway declared at the recent convention of the federation in Brussels. "How can we wish to deal with our former enemies if we haven't the moral courage to get together in peace? Maybe there has been a change of heart among our former enemies. Perhaps there never will be unless we are men enough to undertake to carry to them our peace message. France and Belgium positively are entitled to reparations, but hoarding and keeping in our heart ancient prejudices will not bring the peace we earned by our victory."

Charles Hertrand, president of the federation, representing the views of France and Belgium, indicated that he would favor admittance of the men from the enemy countries as soon as they evinced a desire to pay reparations.

AUXILIARY IS TO HAVE HOME

Alma (Kan.) Organization, With Only Twenty-five Members in Small Town, Sets Example.

A memorial home, for use by all townspeople is the objective of a unit of the American Legion Auxiliary in Alma, Kan. The building, which the women workers of the organization propose to erect, will contain an auditorium, a gymnasium, and a service kitchen. On the second floor, quarters for the Legion and for the Auxiliary will be established. While the erection of such a home is not unusual in auxiliary circles, it is an extraordinary undertaking in the case of this unit, which has a membership of 25, in a town of only 780 inhabitants. The women own a site for the proposed home purchased at a cost of \$2000, and plan early erection of the community memorial.

Sunday School Lesson

(By REV. F. B. FITZWATER, D. D., Teacher of English Bible in the Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.)

LESSON FOR NOVEMBER 4

WORLD-WIDE PROHIBITION—WORLD'S TEMPERANCE SUNDAY.

LESSON TEXT—Ps. 101:1-3; Prov. 23:29-35.

GOLDEN TEXT—"I will set no wicked thing before my eyes."—Ps. 101:3.

PRIMARY TOPIC—Taking Care of Our Bodies.

JUNIOR TOPIC—The Effects of Alcohol.

INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Progress of Prohibition at Home and Abroad.

YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Fight Against Lawlessness.

I. Principles of a Righteous Life (Ps. 101:1-3).

This is a psalm of David the king, and therefore shows the conduct of a ruler. It is divided into two sections—the first, verses 1-4, refers to personal conduct, and the second, 5-8, to the government of others. This part of the lesson can only refer to the destruction of the saloon in the sense that all evil is to be uprooted and destroyed.

1. Personal Conduct (vv. 1-4). (1) Kindness and judgment (v. 1); (2) wise behavior (v. 2); (3) all malice put away (v. 3); all wickedness put aside (v. 4).

2. Government of Others (vv. 5-8). Only as one is right in his own heart and life is he fit to rule others. As a righteous man he will be against (1) the slanderer (v. 5). He will not tolerate such in his presence. (2) The worker of deceit (v. 7). The deceitful man and the liar are to be removed from his sight. (3) All workers of iniquity (v. 8). It is the duty of rulers to see that all workers of wickedness of all kinds be cut off. The manufacturer and seller of liquor should be regarded as notorious workers of iniquity. Those who might stand for social gain are greatly wicked.

"The Awful Run Wrought by Strong Drink" (Prov. 23:29-35).

1. Woes of Those Who Inherit in Wine (vv. 2, 30). (1) The awful pain which causes one to cry out, "Oh! My head, indeed, give the pains which you suffer because of strong drink. Surely the innumerable can be traced to its evil influence. (2) The bitter sorrow, which causes one to cry out, "Alas! Many are the expressions of bitter regret which daily come from the lips of the drunkard. (3) Contention—strife and quarreling. Much of the fighting among men is directly caused by their passions being inflamed by strong drink. The drunkard is always ready to take offense, as well as to give it. (4) Whistling and quarreling. The whistling quarrels of everything—of luck, loss of friends, of fate and of God. He sees everything wrong but himself. (5) Wounds without reason. There are wounds from fights in which a sober man would not have engaged, and from accidents which are purely the result of intoxication. (6) Redness of eyes. This has reference to the blood-shot eye of the tippler which dims his vision. All these woes come upon those who are very fond of wine.

2. The Attitude Exposed (v. 31). Look not at it. Do not put yourself into the way of temptation. The only safe attitude toward strong drink is total abstinence, and the only way to total abstinence is not to even look at it.

3. The Drunkard's Bitter End (vv. 32-35).

1. Acute Miseries. "It biteth like a serpent and stingeth like an adder." Strong drink, like the poison of a serpent, permeates the whole system and ends in the most fatal consequences.

2. Perversion of the Moral Sense. This excitement causes the eyes to behold strange things. This denotes the fantastic images produced on the brain of the drunkard. Even when delirium tremens does not result, there are awful fancies which are beyond the possibility of realization. Then does his heart utter perverse things. His moral sense being perverted, his utterances partake of the same. He tells lies; his words cannot be relied upon.

3. He Is Insensibly to Danger (v. 34). He is foolishly, even as one who would lie in the top of a ship's mast, where there is the greatest danger of falling off.

4. He Is Insensible to Pain (v. 35). The drunkard is utterly ignorant of what happens to him while under the influence of strong drink. Many bruises and wounds the drunkard has which he cannot account for.

5. His Abject Bondage (v. 35). After all his sufferings, sorrow and disappointments, he goes on as a bond slave in the ways of sin.

6. Hell at Last. No drunkard shall inherit the kingdom of heaven (I Cor. 6:10).
