Barnwell Association at Mt. Arnon.

The annual session of the Barnwell Baptist Association, which comprises 33 churches in Allendale, Barnberg and Barnwell Counties met on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week with the Mt. Arnon Church, which is four miles from Allendale. These Churches were well represented by messengers, and the statistical and financial reports reflected a gratifying spiritual condition, and increased prosperity. Dr. Robert Black, of Bamberg, was elected moderator, Mr. N. H. Fender, Branchville, was re-elected clerk and Mr. E. E. Johnston of Elko, was re-elected secretary. The introductory sermon was preached by Rev. O. E. Falk, of Bamberg and the missionary sermon by Dr. W. M. Jones, of Barnwell. Owing to the fact that there was a conflict of dates with the Welsh Neck association, only one of the board representatives, Dr. C. A. Egan, of Columbia, was present. The association will meet next year with Pleasant Hill Church near Williston. The churches comprising this body renews a membership in these numbers of over 4,000, with over 100 baptisms last year, and with 100,000 in B. Y. P. U. work. They paid in treasury's salaries over \$20,000, in the 75 million campaign they paid over \$10,000. The financial total of all funds raised during the year exceeded \$100,000.

COUNTY TREASURER'S TAX NOTICE.

The tax books for the collection of 1923 taxes will be open from Oct. 15 to Dec. 15, 1923, inclusive, without penalty. From January 1st to March 15th the regular lawful penalties will be added. Books close March 15th, 1924.

The tax books are made up by school districts. In asking for your taxes be sure and state school district in which property is located. Dogs are not entered on the tax books. Separate receipt and tags will be given for dogs over six months old.
