LEGION'S NATIONAL CHAPLAIN

Rev. Ezra C. Clemans, Known as "Padre," Has Seen Long Military Service.

It was on the Mexican border Ezra C. Clemans, national chapla, the American Legion, won the till "Padre," which has clung to him throughout the years of the World war and up to the time of his selection as new chaplain of the veterans' organization.

For 37 years, Chaplain Clemans has given service to the military organizations of his state and nation. He graduuated from Shattuck school, a semi-Member of Brotherhood of Locometive military academy in his home state of Minnesota, in his nineteenth year, and in the same year enlisted as a private in the Faribault Guards, an orgánization of that city.
