History of the Flag of the 25th Regt. of Hagood's Brigade.

On August 21st, 1864, when the Brigade made the charge on the Weidon Railroad against Gen. Cutler's Brigade of Massachusetts, three color bearers went down before the flag was taken.

About two years ago an article appeared in the Butte (Montana) Tribune, stating that a Regimental flag of the 25th S. C. had been pledged in a gambling saloon for a stake of \$25. Then the flag disappeared. Later an article concerning the flag appeared in The Veteran, Doctor T. Grance Simons, of Charleston, a survivor of the 25th, got into communication with the author of the article, and traced the flag as being in the possession of the Boston Chapter, U. D. C., and Mrs. Harold, of Americus, Ga., Regent General of the U. D. C., has transmitted the flag to Dr. Simons.

On the 22nd of February—Washington's birthday—the flag will be presented to the State and received by the Governor.

There are only five survivors of the Brigade in Charleston, and Dr. Simons is anxious to have as many survivors of the Brigade present as possible, and has requested me to give extended notice of the event.

The ceremonies attending the presentation of the flag will take place at 3 p. m. on Marion Square, Charleston, the afternoon of the 22nd.

Death of Edmund A. Felder.

Anderson, Feb. 11.—Edmund A. Felder, 65, of Blackville, traveling salesman for a fertilizer concern, died suddenly at a local hotel at 9:30 o'clock this morning from heart trouble. He leaves a wife and daughter, who reside at Charleston.

The sad news was received in the city yesterday of the death of Mr. Felder at the Plaza hotel, Anderson. His death came as a great shock to his many friends all over the State.

He was a native of Orangeburg County. At the time of his death he was about 65 years old. Mr. Felder spent a number of years in Columbia. For several years, during the incumbency of E. J. Watson, commissioner, he was connected with the agricultural department of the State. During the war he was engaged in the work of the cantonment company in connection with Camp Jackson; subsequently he was engaged in the manufacturing business and for several years was a cotton factor and commission merchant. He was a man of very large and considerable business experience. He was one of the managers of the exposition at St. Louis and later of a similar exposition in Rome.

He was a man of great ability and culture, of strict integrity of character, of a genial disposition and of exceptional refinement. He was at all times and under all conditions a gentleman. He had a great many friends in Columbia and all deplore and mourn his loss.

Mr. Felder leaves a widow, who

was Miss Alice Rutledge Reese, of Charleston, and one daughter, Katharine, now Mrs. Blackmon Hughes of Charleston. He also leaves a brother, Clinton Felder, of Blackville. He was a nephew of Judge Maher. He is to be buried at the old burial ground at Barnwell at noon Wednesday.—The State, Feb. 12.

Furtick-Carter.

Miss Thelma Furtick, of Barnwell, and Mr. Leland Carter, of Ehrhardt, were married in Bamberg Sunday afternoon, Probate Judge J. J. Brabham performing the ceremony. They will make their home in Ehrhardt.

Bronze Medal Offered.

Springfield, Illinois was the home of Abraham Lincoln. His body was interred in that city. A magnificent monument, erected largely by the pennies and small coins of the children of the nation, shelter his body.

An association has been developing through a number of years to stimulate the study of Lincoln throughout the world, to mark those places in the city and nearby, which he made sacred by his presence, and otherwise to make it worthy of the world shrine it has come to be.

The Illinois Watch Company, of Springfield, has undertaken to create interest and increase knowledge and admiration of Lincoln among school children in the United States. As a civic duty and part of the Lincoln program this company is offering a beautiful bronze medal to a pupil in each High School in the United States for writing the best short essay on the life of Lincoln.

One of these medals is now on display at J. R. Harrison's store, and will be presented to a student of the Barnwell Graded School, in the near future.

The medal is three inches in diameter. The head of Lincoln is a reproduction of Douglas Volk's famous painting, "Abraham Lincoln." The sculpturing is the work of Charles L. Hinton, an artist of note. Both artists are Americans. A space is provided on the back of the medal for the name of the winner. No advertising of any kind is found on the medal.
