Auto Accident Near Barnwell.

An automobile wreck that came near resulting in the death of one or more persons was that which occurred about a mile from town last Saturday night about 8:30 o'clock on the Barnwell-Buncombe road opposite the W. H. Duncan place. A Ford roadster driven by Mrs. Rosenboro of Snelling collided with a buggy occupied by a negro named John Hammond and a Ford touring car driven by Mr. and Mrs. Wise and several others of Donora. When Mrs. Rosenboro's car collided with the buggy it was turned over and stopped acrosswise the road which caused the collision with the touring car. The buggy was knocked against an oak tree which prevented it from falling into a deep ditch. Mrs. Rosenboro suffered a sprained arm and a bruise on the head, while a negro woman who occupied the car with her escaped with a slight shake up. None of the occupants of the other car was injured. The buggy was almost a complete wreck, while both cars got off with minor damages.
